Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2019.

Chairperson's report 2018/19

It gives me great pleasure to present the chair's report for 2018/19; the eleventh year since Dyfodol Powys Futures (DPF) was formed from the Powys Children and Families Forum.

During 2018/19 we have become a smaller organisation, although we continue to deliver some important services that are meeting identified needs in the County.

We submitted the final report for our Finding Futures project-funded by Comic Relief. So much was achieved during its three years of operation. In addition to our final report to Comic Relief we produced a separate report on the achievements, outcomes and learning which was widely disseminated to our partners, Councillors, AM's and MP's. We felt it was particularly important that recognition should be given to the important lessons we had learned from our work with young people about their needs and the value they placed on our person centred approach in our relationship and work with them.

We very much appreciated the continued support we received from PDAC, which allowed us to provide ongoing one to one support for young men in Newtown-a need identified through the Finding Futures work.

Our Touch Trust sessions have extended the areas and range of provision. Our model of delivering Touch Trust is unique in Wales and a model that fits the needs of participants and their families living in rural Powys. Again our thanks go to the funders who have recognised the importance of this initiative and have provided financial support.

My thanks go to all our funders for supporting us in our work-it is heartening that some have supported us on more than one occasion. Our dedicated staff have ensured, through their hard efforts the continued success of the organisation and are committed to exploring all avenues in securing the funding needed to continue our work-this is no easy task in an environment where sources of funding from trusts and independent funders are over subscribed and grants from traditional sources are limited. My sincere thanks go to our staff.

My appreciation goes also to my colleagues the Dyfodol trustees who individually make a huge contribution to the good governance of the organisation. Many having been involved for a number of years. Together, alongside Dyfodol staff, we will ensure that the organisation can continue to play a positive role in the life of Powys Children, Young People and their families.

Trustees' Report

Senior Co-ordinator's Overview

Although the number of projects we are delivering is small, we are justifiably proud of their impact and success. In a world of shrinking public services we are continuing to identify and fill gaps in provision.

The Finding Futures project, which was set up with Comic Relief Funding to work with young people with barriers to moving forward with their lives, in particular to entering training or gaining employment, drew to a close in the summer. We are incredibly proud of its success in supporting young people to improve their life chances.

Funding was secured from PDAC to work with a group of young people in Newtown who were identified through the Finding Futures project but who need more targeted support in relation to drugs and alcohol issues. Although it was originally intended to be a time limited project it quickly became apparent that there was a need for a longer term piece of work.

The Touch Trust project continues to work with children with disabilities and their parents/carers to offer a creative sensory programme. It has expanded to offer sessions to adults with learning difficulties. This piece of work continues to be very highly valued by all those using it and we have been fortunate to secure the support of a number of funders.

We continue to be grateful to Play Radnor for giving us a base at the Play Hub.

Objectives and activities

The mission statement for Dyfodol Powys Futures;

To enhance the development, education and future prospects of children and young people in the County of Powys and other locations in Wales to which the Charity's resources can be effectively deployed, by providing services to meet their needs. In particular the Charity aims to provide facilities for their daily care, recreation and development as well as providing training, guidance and information for them, their families and for those working with them."

Our aims are:

- to provide high quality services that lead to improved outcomes for children, young people and families in Powys;
- to work closely and in partnership with other voluntary and statutory agencies ensuring maximum use of resources in meeting needs and in forming strategy;
- to maintain and develop Dyfodol Powys Futures as an effective organisation to deliver services for children, young people and families in Powys and other locations in Wales.

Our objectives are:

- to support families by providing information and guidance to them on a 1:1 basis or in a group setting
- to care for children and young people and support families in accessing childcare across the county
- to provide training to families to enable them to enhance the development and education of their children, i.e. parenting support, confidence building and life skills
- to provide support and information to those working with families through, for example, information days on specific topics or through specific bespoke training
- to support families to access training, for example to access college courses or more informal training
- to provide opportunities for recreational activities out of and during school holidays

Financial review

Structure, governance and management

Dyfodol Powys Futures is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association. The charity is registered at the Charity Commission as a charity and in the opinion of the Board is, therefore, not liable to corporation tax. The Board who served during the period are as set out on page 1.

Dyfodol Powys Futures was established in 2008 and registered as a Charity and a Company Limited by Guarantee in the same year. The organisation previously operated as Powys Children and Families Forum, which had been in existence since 1987. The change to Dyfodol followed consultation with members and the wider voluntary and statutory sector to better meet the needs of the community and the services it had been providing and wished to provide in the future. The ethos of the organisation remains one which values sharing expertise and resources, avoiding duplication, working together to develop coherent approaches to working with families in a fashion that encourages innovation and methods built solidly on the real experiences of the communities we serve.

Dyfodol Powys Futures is managed by a Board of trustees. The Board is supported by a 2 strong staff team led by the Senior Coordinator.

Method of appointment of trustee/directors:

The Charity may appoint Directors by ordinary resolution-appoint a person who is willing to act to be a Director-and determine the rotation in which additional Directors are to retire.

No person other than a Director retiring by rotation may be appointed a Director at any general meeting unless:

- (i) he or she is recommended for re-election by the Directors: or
- (ii) not less than fourteen nor more than thirty-five clear days before the date of the meeting, the Charity is given a notice that:
- (a) is signed by a member entitled to vote at the meeting
- (b) states the member's intention to propose the appointment of a person as a Director
- (c) contains the details that, if the person were to be appointed, the Charity would have to file at Companies House; and
- (d) is signed by the person who is to be proposed to show his or her willingness to be appointed.

All members who are entitled to receive notice of a general meeting must be given not less than seven nor more than twenty-eight clear days' notice of any resolution to be put to the meeting to appoint a Director who is to retire by rotation.

Trustees' Report

The Directors may appoint a person who is willing to act to be a Director. A Director appointed by a resolution of the other Directors must retire at the next annual general meeting and must not be taken into account in determining the Directors who are to retire by rotation.

The appointment of a Director, whether by the Charity in a general meeting or by the other Directors, must not cause the number of Directors to exceed any number fixed as the maximum number of Directors.

Achievements and performance; an overview;

During the past year, Dyfodol Powys Futures has again supported children, young people and families in Powys working to three main aims, these are;

- 1. To provide high quality services that lead to genuine, improved outcomes
- 2. To work closely and in partnership with other voluntary and statutory agencies to ensure maximum use of resources in meeting needs and in forming strategy, and
- 3. Ensuring Dyfodol Powys Futures remains an effective organisation to deliver services for children, young people and families in Powys.

1) Finding Futures

Finding Futures was a 3 year project funded by Comic Relief, which commenced in May 2015 and worked with young people with barriers to moving forwards in their lives, particularly in relation to education, training and employment. It drew to a close after successfully engaging with, supporting and enabling a significant number of young people.

Over its period of operation the project exceeded its targets for working with individual young people and engaged with individuals with a wide variety of needs and barriers, including mental health issues, disabilities and additional needs and difficult home circumstances. Many of these young people could be defined as "hard to reach" and many have either disengaged or failed to engage with other services.

We have seen young people training and commencing work as building labourers, beauticians and computer technicians, amongst some of the many success stories. For some young people success has been defined as being able to leave their house and take up a volunteering opportunity, or to engage with other young people.

The key success of the project has been its flexibility, and the scope for it to provide bespoke person-centred support on an individual basis to empower young people to move forwards in their lives.

We produced an end of project report which we circulated to the wider sector, to share our experiences of working with this group of young people.

2) Touch Trust Project

The Touch Trust project began in 2016 to run creative sensory sessions for children and young people with disabilities and their families. It is affiliated to the Touch Trust nationally.

This year we expanded the scope of the project to work with adults with learning difficulties, on a fee paying basis.

Around 14 families attended family sessions over the year and the feedback has continued to be overwhelmingly positive, with some children developing significant new skills, and all enjoying the opportunities on offer. The Touch Trust project has helped to bring families together for friendship and mutual support, in addition to the benefits of the sensory programme itself.

Around 7 individuals have been regularly attending the sessions for adults. Again, feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.

We have received support via The Welsh Church Acts Fund, The Gwendoline and Margaret Davies Trust and the Archbishop of Wales Fund for family sessions and via Llandrindod Town Council towards the cost of adults' sessions. We also received funding from Powys County Council to train a fourth facilitator, to work in the Newtown area.

3) PDAC Funded Young People's Project

This project began in October 2017, with the aim of supporting a group of young men, identified via the Finding Futures Project, who were experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, drug and alcohol related issues.

A youth worker was employed to work for one day per week to try to support the individuals in accessing specialist support. The project has developed in a similar way to other DPF projects, where staff go directly out to individuals and meet them where they feel comfortable to meet. The original plan was to facilitate groups but it became clear that there was a significant amount of individual work needed.

The initial plan was to work with an identified group of young men, but the project began receiving new referrals and it became clear that there was a need for a wider piece of work.

As, with other projects, the DPF approach to engaging with and supporting individuals has proven successful and we have been able to connect with those who have been disengaged from other services. A close working partnership has developed between statutory services and DPF and there have been a number of individual successes, at a time when there has been significant concern over particular issues around antisocial behaviour in Newtown. One of our strengths as an organisation has proved to be our ability to stand outside the statutory system, meaning that young people view us in a different light.

A number of young people have been supported to make significant positive changes in their lives.

We were grateful to receive several extensions to the original funding received from PDAC and are now making grant applications to put the project on a more long term footing.

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

Dyfodol Powys Futures meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2019

Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities incudes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

The charity has a policy of writing off computers and office equipment in full at purchase.

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2019

Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Welsh Council for Voluntary Action is European funding for a one year initiative for clients that are not in employment, education or training.
