## Report of the trustees (incorporating the directors' report) for the period ended 31 December 2010

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2010. The trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law and who served during the period and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in October 2008 in preparing the annual report and financial statement of the charity.

#### Incorporation

The charity was incorporated as a limited company by guarantee of £1 on 6 July 2009

#### Structure, governance and management

The body responsible for the management of the Charity is the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees meets regularly to manage its affairs

#### **Board members of Trustees**

The members of the Board of Trustees who served during the year 2010 are listed on page 1 of the financial statements. Trustees are appointed and removed by the Members

#### Objectives and activities

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association

The charity's aims and objectives are.

- 1 To systematically propagate spiritual knowledge to society at large and to educate all peoples in the techniques of spiritual life in order to check the imbalance of values in life and to achieve real unity and peace within the world.
- 2 To propagate a consciousness of Krishna, as it is revealed in Bhagavad-Gita and Srimad Bhagavatam
- 3 To bring the members of the society together with each other and nearer to Krishna, the prime entity, thus developing the idea within the members, and humanity at large, that each soul is part and parcel of the quality of Godhead (Krishna)
- 4 To teach and encourage the sankurtan movement, congregational chanting of the holy names of God, as revealed in the teachings of Lord Sri Caitanya Mahaprabhu
- 5 To erect for the members and for society at large a holy place of transcendental pastimes dedicated to the personality of Krishna
- 6. To bring members together for the purpose of teaching a simpler, more natural way of life
- 7 With a view to achieving the aforementioned purposes, to publish and distribute periodicals, books and other writings

The charity seeks to provide services of spiritual excellence in education, life style and culture as revealed in the teachings of the ancient scriptures of India, Bhagavad Gita, Srimad Bhagavatam and according to the teachings of His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swamii Prabhupada, Founder-Acharya of the International Society for Krishna Consciousness. Through the extensive educational services to schools, colleges and universities distribution of and presentations from its various publications and through the numerous largely attended festivals, the charity offers a cultural presentation for the re-spiritualization of the entire human society. It seeks to offer a clue as to how humanity can become one in peace, friendship and prosperity with a common cause.

## Report of the trustees (incorporating the directors' report) for the period ended 31 December 2010

#### Achievements and performance

The primary focus for 2010 was to concentrate on community development. The Trustees feel this was an important area of focus in order to build a long-term sustainable team of volunteers and committed individuals who can take positions of responsibility and assist with our charitable activities. Also investing in those who are already committed will serve to enhance their spiritual and moral values, which will make deeper and more profound contribution and impact on the society we live in.

The charity did this through the following projects

- 1) Spiritual Counselor System, the number of counselors increased from 11 to 13 with many more potential counsellors in the community being identified and cultivated within the system. The counselees also increased in quantity and quality, with many stepping forward to be active in management and taking vows of spiritual commitment. The charity continued to have regular training courses throughout the year for new counselees on the basics of the charity's philosophy and also held a major retreat for all the counsellors and counselees in November 2010, which was very well attended.
- 2) Establishing a Congregational Development Leader and follow-up team. The charity established a team leader and a team of approximately nine members looking after different areas such as membership, sponsorship, guest greeting, training, volunteer care, follow-up and festival planning. This team is and will be a valuable asset to the fund & friend raising efforts
- 3) Establishing an Outreach Department leader focusing on out-reach within universities and regular guests—the charity established a department leader for this area. He has become a university chaplain and is assisting students from many of the local universities in their search for higher spiritual resolutions to life's problems. He also works within interfaith and is personally training and guiding many new-comers.
- 4) Hold regular seminars with core members of the community in order to focus on developing skills and relationships necessary to expand activities: this has been the most constructive department this year. The charity has held, and continues to hold, regular courses on a myriad of subjects both for residents and members of the community. These seminars range from various scales of understanding of the philosophy, to yoga classes, & practical courses, which facilitate worship in the Temple, all very successfully attended and supporting funding

The charity's most significant project and accomplishment of 2010 was a complete refurbishment of the main altar. This project took 2.5 months and cost approximately £62,000 - being slightly over budget. The project was overseen by one of the community members from start to finish and was a great success. It has greatly enhanced the standard of worship offered in the Temple and inspired the community with deeper faith and conviction.

The "Weekend Warnors" programme also continued to grow from strength to strength with community members going out together to distribute literatures, sanctified food and chanting in numerous boroughs in London. This has created a real team spirit amongst the community and has lead to smaller groups forming in each area which have also started to meet regularly outside of the official "Weekend Warnor" programmes. This means that the charity's mission is spreading and growing

All of these activities have made a tremendous difference in the lives of congregation members who are now feeling fulfilled in the development of their spiritual lives as well as numerous people from the Greater London society who can see the benefits of our works in supporting higher moral principles and values such as health (vegetarianism and meditation), education, proper conduct and community building.

The principle fund raising objectives remained the same. These were

- o To carefully account for and spend funds raised for the purpose for which they were raised and in preaching activities.
- o To inform donors of the projects to which their donated funds were used.
- o To follow the laws of the land while raising and accounting for the funds

## Report of the trustees (incorporating the directors' report) for the period ended 31 December 2010

In order to achieve these objectives we regularly inform and communicate the result of our activities and the use of funds raised during the year

Our principle funding sources were

- o Govinda's restaurant
- o Temple shop- Radha's Boutique
- o The congregation through memberships
- o Donation boxes in the Temple
- o Festivals contributions
- o Book distribution

The charity has about 60 part time volunteers who serve regularly each week for between 5 to 16 hours each week. The charity's centre is heavily dependent on the service of volunteers as certain services are better done by unpaid volunteers rather than paid workers

The charity does not hold any assets for any individuals or organizations and all current trustees act solely as custodians for the organization except for James Edwards who is a trustee of ISKCON UK and of the Sri Sri Radha-Krishna Cultural Centre

#### Plans for future periods

The Trustees have the following plans for future perids

- I Investment in the sanctified food distribution through a refurbishment of the charity's restaurant and kitchen. This will be achieved by working with the same designer who transformed the altar and by raising funds in the region of £40,000. This will create a more wholesome environment for customers to come and honour the sanctified food.
- 2 Purchase of a local property to expand the charity's gift shop and possibly open a hostel, which will provide accommodation for the youth who are seeking spiritual shelter while completing their studies. The charity will engage some of the prominent donors and patron members in investigating and investing in property near to the Temple. This will enable the charity to build a closer, stronger community and give the shop front a more ideal location in the public eye
- 3 Further community development through the Spiritual Counselor System, Training and Education and out-reach programmes. This will continue in order to maintain and grow organically. This will also continue to feed into the projects' strong munded, educated volunteers who can engage their skills and talents in service.
- 4. Developing smaller centers throughout Southeast of England. The charity will send out some trained counselees and counsellors to the smaller growing centers and share education and community development programmes. This will strengthen the community and have a positive impact on the local societies.
- 5 Increasing the distribution of literatures. The charity will train and educate distributors in techniques conducive to sharing the message. This will feed into local centers project and assist with its growth.
- 6 Establish a record label that will inspire and engage those who are artistically talented. The charity will appoint a head of this department and promote the release of a major compilation of music from talented community members that can raise awareness and engage their talents. This will engage many artist members of the community and help them find a spiritual focus for their talents as well as generating revenue.

#### Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are funds raised for, or dedicated to, specific projects. In the event that the funds have been raised and the project remains incomplete or terminated, the funds will be returned to the respective donors, unless permission has been given by the donor to use the donation for another purpose

During 2010, the Charity received £155,923 of incoming resources for restricted activities and incurred expenditure of £31,553 in respect of these activities. The total restricted funds at the end of the year were £124,370

The specific projects for this funds are

Currently the charity has £87,000 set aside for the New Temple Project, £11,000 as deity reserves and £4,000 as Nitya Seva reserves. The deity reserves may be used in 2011 but the New Temple Project would need millions of pounds before it can be used for this purpose

#### Reserve Funds

The Finance Committee, which is appointed by department manager manages the reserved funds and the trustees make decisions as to the use and allocation of the funds on the basis of risks associated with income streams and expenditure plans. The reserve funds are kept separate from the general cash flow of the Temple

Departments within the Temple have reserve funds, which are held to provide ongoing financial security for the Temple worship. These funds are required for reorganisation in the event of a down turn in income, to protect ongoing work programmes, temple refurbishments, to invest in the new farm, Hindu school and to make grants to Iskon worldwide family.

The trustees receive regular reports from each department to update budget, cash flow forecasts and to accurately monitor and review the reserve position. At present £17,600 is set aside as Restaurant Refurbishment Reserves.

#### Financial review

The statement of Financial Activities shows a net income and reserves for the year of £296,979

ISKCON London is in a secure financial position. All departments have been working to develop a firm base of donors who contribute on a monthly basis via standing order and this has created current stability and will continue to provide a firm basis for the years to come

#### Statement as to disclosure of information to auditors

#### 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the period

#### 1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

#### 1.2. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable

#### 1.3. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes including the charity's shop

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### 1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

Plant and machinery

20% straight balance

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of its being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member
