#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Mooji Foundation Ltd originated as a group of volunteers and was eventually incorporated in November 2009 as a company limited by guarantee with Companies House (07086049). It was granted charitable status by the Charity Commission of England and Wales in September 2011 under the Charity Registration Number 1144016.

#### Organisational Structure

The Trustees are responsible for overseeing and managing the Charity, and are involved in all significant decisions made. We enjoy giving our time for the purpose of furthering Mooji Foundation's objectives and making Satsang available to whoever desires it. We receive no remuneration or other financial benefits from this work. We have 4–6 Trustee Board meetings per year and all of us are also fully involved in the daily running of Mooji Foundation Ltd. We work together with a number of subcommittees and volunteers and three paid staff members alongside a number of temporary workers and a core team of 7. These subcommittees are as follows:

Public Communications Committee Special Requests Committee

The above subcommittees meet regularly in order to ensure that the various services we provide to the general public run smoothly. The level of commitment from everyone involved is outstanding. In both of these committees at least one Trustee is present and guides the group and the subcommittees are continuously reviewed and improved upon as the organisation evolves and progresses. For 2016, we anticipate to add a Sponsorship and Concession subcommittee.

We work in collaboration with organisations associated with Sri Mooji, such as Mooji Media Ltd (Our Trading Subsidiary), Buddleia Media Pvt Ltd, and Associação Mooji Sangha. Working together greatly facilitates the furthering of our objects.

In December 2014 we reviewed our relationship with Mooji Media Ltd (previously Padam Sangha Ltd.) and the shares held by Anthony Paul Moo Young were graciously donated to Mooji Foundation Ltd. The Trustees obtained professional legal and financial advice and found this to be the best way to maximise the relationship. Mooji Media Ltd had already donated its profits to Mooji Foundation Ltd and has collaborated with us on many projects. 2015, saw the new movement of Mooji Media Ltd as the trading subsidiary under Mooji Foundation Ltd at its full capacity.

#### Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

The existing Trustees are responsible for the recruitment of new Trustees but in doing so the Trustees seek the view and recommendation of our Patron Anthony Paul Moo-Young ("Sri Mooji") as well as the advice of the sub committees. The Trustees feel that this approach ensures that new Trustees are respected within the organisation as a whole.

When looking for new Trustees we seek those that have volunteered with the organisation for some years and that have shown a true connection with the teachings of Sri Mooji. We also seek those who are broad in their way of working and who have specific skills that we may need to enhance the organisation. We invite potential Trustees to meetings before they are appointed so that they are aware of the scope of work and what is expected of them. A consensus vote is then made amongst the current Trustees to officially vote in the new Trustees. We feel this method allows due consideration of the person's eligibility, personal competence, specialist knowledge and skills.

#### Training of the Trustees

Following appointment, the new Trustees are introduced to their role and are briefed on the policies and guidelines of the charity and the scope of the work that currently takes place. We have a library of the Charity Commission's guidelines and all Trustees are presented with this material. This ensures that new Trustees are aware of the scope of their new responsibilities within the charity and under the Charities Act. In the beginning a new trustee will work alongside a current trustee to ensure that they are moving in the right direction and they will assist in smaller tasks. Once they receive satisfactory results from the existing Trustees they are then entrusted with a specific project or activity, and will report at the trustee meetings.

In the planning, implementation and evaluation of the activities of Mooji Foundation Ltd, we take utmost care that equal opportunities are observed and met. In addition, we are always open to receiving feedback on how we are progressing. It is important to us that the insights that come out of our inner introspection and faith are part of everything that we do, together with being aware of best practice and regulations for the Charities sector.

#### Reserves Policy

The Trustees have examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should be for 6 months of the expenditure. Budgeted expenditure for Mooji Foundation Ltd for 2015/2016 is GBP 120,000 and therefore the target is GBP 60,000 in general funds. The reserves are needed to meet the working capital requirements of the charity and the Trustees are confident that at this level they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding. The actual reserves are higher than GBP 1,000,000 and the Trustees are pleased that the immediate financial security of the charity has been achieved by the growth in reserves. As the charity's activities evolve, the level of reserves will be reviewed and utilised.

#### **Investment Policy**

As our organisation continues to develop and grow we are currently looking at investing through an investment fund and working with our current bank, HSBC, in the UK to see how we can make the most of Mooji Foundation's cash holdings. As we continue to evaluate and explore these opportunities it is important for us to consider to look at investment funds that are consistent with our culture and aims.

The group's net assets at the end of 2015 arc £1,202,000. The total value of the assets is £1,239,000 which consist of £1,180,000 cash and bank and £51,000 current assets. The total value of the liabilities is £37,000.

The group's net assets are sufficient to cover the requirement set by the reserve policy of £60,000 in general funds.

#### Principal Risks and Uncertainties Facing the Group

The charity is currently formed around our spiritual leader, Sri Mooji (Anthony Paul Moo-Young) and most of our donations are derived from events and retreats at which Sri Mooji is physically present at. The risk the charity faces, is that should something adverse happen to Sri Mooji, this form of income may cease. The charity reviews and reflects this prospect but is confident that even though less income may be generated from events, there is still likely to be a steady income stream of donations from Mooji Media Ltd (through the sale of books and CDs). We also anticipate that donations from devotees will continue to come in due to the number of videos the Charity uploads from the endless archive and library that we have. The addition of Mooji Media Ltd as a trading subsidiary under Mooji Foundation Ltd, greatly safeguards the charity in the long term. The charity's reserves policy also reflects this risk.

#### Other risks facing the group are:

Cancellation of an event: In case of the cancellation of an event by Mooji Foundation Ltd or the Venue where the event is to take place, there will be considerable costs but no revenue. This risk is mitigated by the general terms for the participants which states that these costs can be deducted from any refunds in case of cancellation.

Event liability: In case of damages to the venue that occur during an event by any team member of Mooji Foundation Ltd or a participant, there can be considerable costs, this risk is mitigated by holding at least 40% of the venue hire cost until after the end of any event.

### Personal injuries liability:

In case of personal injuries by a participant during a retreat, there can be substantial liability claims. This risk is mitigated by the general terms for participants which states that Mooji Foundation Ltd and its staff don't accept any liability for personal injuries during the retreats. A great deal of care is taken during the events and organisation to prevent the likelihood of injuries.

Damages to shop inventory – Mooji Media: The shop inventory can be damaged by fire or water. There is currently no insurance mitigating this risk because of the relatively low financial value of the inventory.

Damages to assets of Mooji Media: Equipment such as computers, cameras and other audio and video equipment can be damaged during use, storage or travel. There is currently no insurance mitigating this risk because of the relatively low financial value of the inventory.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES**

#### **Objectives**

During the planning and review of our activities, the Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's 3 public benefit guides, namely PB1, PB2 and PB3. Mooji Foundation Ltd is committed to the promotion of moral and spiritual welfare of all by promoting the teachings and practical methodology of the Advaita Vedanta school of Hindu philosophy.

How our activities deliver public benefit:

The charity carried out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The Trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, provide benefit to those that attended the events and to those that took part watching Satsangs from all over the world via the offerings we provide freely over the internet.

We raise awareness and understanding of Advaita Vedanta and encourage and facilitate its practice by:

Organising gatherings and events

Offering opportunities for retreat and pilgrimage

Promoting books, tracts, films and other information for the general public

Providing instruction and supervision in Advaita Vedanta plus actively guiding the process of self-inquiry at our events

Organising for the provision of ceremonies

Providing a wide range of Satsang material and broadcasts via the internet free of charge Selling Satsang products such as audio visual recordings and accessories with quotes and teachings through our trading subsidiary, Mooji Media Ltd

Supporting AMSA by the provision of grants

Encouraging participants to apply their insights to their daily lives, thus benefitting wider society. This includes parents who follow the teachings and instil their spiritual and moral values in their children

#### Strategies

Mooji Foundation Ltd strives to make the Advaita Vedanta school of Hindu philosophy, as taught by Sri Mooji, as accessible as possible to all those who are drawn to it. Below are the most important strategies in making this come true:

Monte Sahaja as an Ashram offers the possibility for people to immerse themselves in the teachings of Sri Mooji and the energy field of Satsang. Those who wish to come apply for the Karma Yoga Program. Each Sunday, when there is a Sunday Satsang on the schedule, the doors to the Ashram are open to all.

Each year, we organise several events in the form of Intensives and Silent Retreats in the United Kingdom and in Portugal. We also organise a 5-week long season of Open Satsangs, in India, usually during February and March. The events in India are free and supported by donations from the participants and through grant funding. A limited number of concessions are offered to participants, who cannot afford to pay the full price of an event.

An important part of our strategy is the use of the internet for a wider sharing of the teachings of Sri Mooji. Online videos also give people all over the world the experience of being present with Sri Mooji regardless of their situation. We have a dedicated channel on YouTube, Livestream, Vimeo as well as our very own Mooji TV. An important facility offered through Mooji TV is Sahaja Express through which we offer spontaneous Satsangs from Monte Sahaja to all those who are not physically at Monte Sahaja but wish to be there. All the web offerings, except Sahaja express and online retreats are freely available online. Valuable services for those who wish to communicate with Sri Mooji, but are physically not near him in the moment, are the audio recordings posted online and free of charge – Podcasts – and Mooji Answers.

For all non-English speakers, we offer translated Satsangs in many languages through YouTube. For this, we are indebted to our many volunteers throughout the world who take their time to translate the Satsangs that deeply touch them and thus make it possible for others to be touched by them as well.

Our outreach is truly worldwide, demanding from us the necessity to offer our services to many groups around the world, who meet to watch the online videos together for fellowship. The universality of the ancient yet vibrant message that Sri Mooji shares is made evident in the strength of these varied communities. Skype and social media are the main tools for communication with and between these groups.

By providing recorded and transcribed Satsangs (i.e. Satsang recordings and books) people can have the experience of Satsang with Sri Mooji at any time and at their convenience. The devotional Satsang music CDs relax the mind and hence allow Sri Mooji's pointings to sink in more deeply. Images of Sri Mooji help people stay in connection with him and his Satsang pointings. All these are available in the Satsang Shop. This is an online shop where people from all over the world are provided with the opportunity to purchase Sri Mooji's Satsang products. The main products sold are downloadable Satsang recordings in both audio and video format, Sri Mooji's books (both physical and electronic), Sri Mooji's recorded Guided Meditations and Satsang Music CDs (both physical and electronic versions), and Images of Sri Mooji in various forms. These products offer support for continued Satsang for all, especially those who are not able to be in the physical proximity of Sri Mooji.

#### **USE OF VOLUNTEERS**

As mentioned previously, Mooji Foundation Ltd is a volunteer organisation and the input of volunteers is invaluable. All the work that takes place happens through volunteers, who give their time and energy abundantly in support of the organisation.

This is because volunteers benefit from the work we do as much as anyone. Volunteers come forward from the participants who attend our events or who make use of our Web offerings. Being deeply touched by what we do, they end up joining the organisation as volunteers. As Mooji Foundation Ltd grows in this way, it in turn opens the door for others to partake in this opportunity. We have three paid staff, yet the time and energy they each put into the work well exceed the scope of their salary. In 2015, there was a core team of between 40 and 50 volunteers who, at various times, were joined by an additional group of around 300 volunteers.

We would like to express our deep gratitude to our spiritual teacher and patron, Sri Mooji, for his devotion and service to the organisation. In addition, we would also like to give reverent salutations to his lineage, his own teacher, Guru Sri Harilal Poonjaji, and his teacher's teacher, Guru Sri Ramana Maharshi.

#### ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS


#### 1. Monte Sahaja

Monte Sahaja is an Ashram and a Retreat Centre and the main vehicle through which the objectives of Mooji Foundation Ltd are carried out. It is also a developing retreat centre situated in Portugal where many visitors can be fully immersed in the environment of Satsang. We feel very happy to support such a magnificent project which is the true outcome of the very essence of Mooji Foundation's objectives and we feel it is the heart and core of all the teachings of Sri Mooji. The organization in Portugal is called The Associacao Mooji Sangha (ASMS) and Mooji Foundation Ltd supports this organization through regular grants. This organization slightly differs from Mooji Foundation Ltd in the sense that it is alive with the presence of Sri Mooji and many spontaneous Satsangs, scheduled weekly Satsangs and smaller retreats. Without the support of Mooji Foundation Ltd the ASMS would not be able to continue to serve the many visitors that come here to be in the presence of Sri Mooji and to contemplate and meditate in a peaceful and natural environment.

Monte Sahaja was created in the spirit of Seva – selfless service and everyone who comes to Monte Sahaja comes with the same spirit. This selfless service is coordinated through the Karma Yoga Program through which the many visitors of the Ashram could offer their time, energy and heart

Many new projects took place at Monte Sahaja this year, particularly in the area of contemplation, meditation, and accommodation. The Sri Mooji Mandir was completed and is being used as the primary Satsang hall at Monte Sahaja. This has been one of the most significant projects of the year as it has allowed the gathering of beings from all over the globe to come together for Satsang with Sri Mooji. The Pergola at Gangotri Pond and the Ramakrishna

Yurt were added to the contemplation spaces. In the second half of the year the work started to create 3 new contemplation spaces: the Chai Shop, Christ Chapel and Mooji Mala.

A new dorm at Kathmandu and 6 new mini huts were added to the accommodation areas at Monte Sahaja in 2015. In addition, 5 new compost toilets were placed next to the new accommodation facilities on the land.

In total, 139 trees, 539 baby trees, 42 big trees and 526 bushes were planted to reforest and beautify the land, as well as provide shaded areas.

16 Sunday Satsangs and 16 Tea Satsangs were held throughout the year with an average of 256 participants. The highest number of participants was 316 and the lowest was 200. These Satsangs were broadcast live. The lowest number of live views (viewing online and in real time) was 1,334 and the highest number of live views was 2,387.

#### 2. Events

These were the events held in 2015 by Mooji Foundation Ltd and in Monte Sahaja (ASMS):

30 Open Satsangs organised and offered in collaboration with Buddleia Media Pvt. Ltd. and Mooji Media Ltd between the 19<sup>th</sup> of February and 23<sup>rd</sup> of March, in Rishikesh, India (from Wednesday to Sunday, broadcast live and free of charge) where the lowest and highest

number of participants in one day were 712 and 1,475 respectively. The lowest and the highest number of broadcast viewers were 675 and 1,258 respectively. Additionally, 3 Satsangs were offered with simultaneous Russian translation and 2 Satsangs in collaboration with the organisers of the International Yoga Festival, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> of March. Nearly 200 volunteers helped in the preparation of the Satsang premises.

2 Silent Retreats were organised at the Zmar, Eco Resort & Spa in Odemira, Portugal. The first was from the 20<sup>th</sup> to the 27<sup>th</sup> of May, and the second was from the 23rd to the 30th of September. The event in May attracted 610 physical participants and 497 online participants. The event in September attracted 628 physical participants and some 440 online participants. In total, 20 concessions were offered and used by 13 participants to these events. Collectively, 26 Satsangs were held at these events.

2 Silent Retreats took place at Monte Sahaja from the 29th of July to 8th of August and from 19th of August to 29th of August with 320 and 308 physical participants respectively and with 424 and 368 online participants respectively. In addition, on 2nd of August and on 23rd of August, the Satsangs from both Retreats were broadcast live as if it were a Sunday Satsang event. In both occasions, 1800 people joined online. These Silent Retreats were held by the Associacao Mooji Sangha in Portugal, and Mooji Foundation Ltd was happy to support an initial grant to help this retreat take place. This retreat demonstrated that our sister organisation is slowly able to raise its own funds.

1 Intensive took place at York Hall in London, UK, from 13th to the 17th of November with 8 Satsangs. It attracted 743 physical participants attending the full retreat and 572 online participants. 6 concessions were offered and used by 5 participants. 80 day visitors also registered, who attended 1 or more Satsang sessions.

After each event, Mooji Foundation Ltd asks for feedback via feedback forms from our participants. It is important for us to know the impact the events we hold have on those that attend and how they have benefited from them, and also how we can and should improve.

#### 3. Web Offerings

The internet and the platforms it offers greatly facilitate the sharing of the teachings. We have dedicated channels on YouTube, Vimeo, Livestream and Mooji TV which allow us to upload full-length Satsang videos of Sri Mooji's spontaneous talks, Satsangs from retreats and answers to questions from seekers from all over the world. All videos, on any of our channels, can be viewed by anyone at any time free of charge.

The YouTube channel 'Moojiji' is for many a door to Satsang. At the end of 2015, this channel had 79,095 subscribers. In total, 74 new videos were uploaded onto this channel this year, which brought the number of videos on this channel to 736. 50 Satsangs were translated into the popular languages such as Spanish, German, Greek, Romanian, and Czech.

Events 2015



In 2015, 15 videos were uploaded onto Vimeo channel which raised the total number of videos uploaded on this channel to 182. Additionally, 65 events were broadcast live via Livestream channel in real time with viewers from around the world. By the end of 2015, the database of audio and video recordings on Mooji TV contained 966 video and 182 audio recordings. All these audio and video recordings are still available online on the above mentioned channels and are for the public free of charge.

Sri Mooji reads every single question he receives from seekers all over the world. In 2015, approximately 329 questions and 76 testimonies were answered by him through email, although the majority were recorded onto video and later posted online.

#### 4. International Sangha

Many different groups have formed as a result of being exposed to Sri Mooji's teachings. Typically, these groups assemble to watch online videos together and for fellowship.

Throughout the year the International Sangha Groups have blossomed, especially after the Satsangs in Rishikesh during February and March. Communication between Sangha Group Organisers has played a role in inspiring and motivating through the Mooji Sangha Global Community (MSGC) Facebook group. Mooji Foundation Ltd is assisting groups around the world with practical guidelines about setting up a group, facilitating online retreats, etc.

In 2015, there were in total 104 groups active throughout the world. Of these, 40 groups were the most active, meeting weekly or at least once per month, as well as for retreats and intensives. These groups were from the following countries: Argentina, Austria, Australia, Canada, Brazil, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, India, Italy, Kazakhstan, Macedonia, Mexico, Moldova, Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Serbia, Singapore, Spain, South Africa, Sweden, UK and USA.

The Sangha groups benefited beyond measure from participating in the retreats and intensives throughout the year via broadcast, gathering at each other's homes and community buildings such as libraries.

21 groups met for the Silent Retreat in May at Zmar, 31 groups for the Silent Retreat in July at Monte Sahaja, 32 groups for the Silent Retreat in August at Monte Sahaja, 47 groups for the Silent Retreat in September at Zmar and finally, 45 groups for the London Intensive in November.

8 Skype Satsangs were held throughout the year with Sri Mooji and groups in Australia (twice), Brazil, the Netherlands, Romania, Sweden, Ukraine and the USA.

Facebook is the most commonly used platform for communication amongst and within groups. There were 252,925 subscribers to the 'Mooji' Facebook page at the end of the year and there were 25,057 subscribers to the 'Mooji Sangha' Facebook page in the same period. The local Sangha groups also have their own pages and in the future we hope to be able to have the capacity to give statistics in the future.

#### 5. Mooji Media Ltd

Mooji Media Ltd is the trading subsidiary of Mooji Foundation Ltd and shares its purpose- the promotion of moral and spiritual welfare for public benefit by promoting the teachings and practical methodology of the Advaita Vedanta school of Hindu Philosophy. It holds the copyrights for all of Sri Mooji's materials such as audio and video recordings, music, photos, written works and artwork. Mooji Media Ltd is responsible for recording, documenting and archiving the teachings, and is the producer and distributor of Sri Mooji's teachings through various media. The channels include Mooji Media Publications for written materials such as books, articles and quotes; Mooji.TV for video and audio Satsangs; and the online Satsangshop, which acts as a major distribution channel for Sri Mooji related products. Mooji Media Ltd also produces and distributes all Satsang related products such as music and guided meditation CDs, DVDs, notebooks, t-shirts, photos and postcards. The profits arising from these trading activities are donated to Mooji Foundation Ltd.

Mooji Media Publications is the publishing imprint of Mooji Media Ltd. It publishes Mooji's own books, and acts as a point of contact for magazines, newspapers and publishers worldwide. Mooji Media Publications oversees all aspects of the sharing of Mooji's teachings in the written form: the transcribing of all of Mooji's formal satangs; the editing and compiling of these transcripts into books; the translation of Mooji's books; proofreading and editing of articles by Third Parties; as well as the contractual aspects of these transactions such as negotiating and signing of publishing contracts for translations.

Since its inception in 2011, Mooji Media Publications has published 4 titles by Sri Mooji (Anthony Paul Moo-Young):

- 1. Writing on Water (2011)
- 2. Before I Am, Second Edition (2012)
- 3. White Fire (2014)
- 4. The Mala of God (2015)

Breath of the Absolute is another book by Sri Mooji that was published in 2010 by Yogi Impressions in India. Mooji Media Publications is involved in the translation projects for this book.

Mooji Media Publications is also in the process of signing a contract with "Sounds True", a U.S.-based publisher, to bring out a book of Mooji's Satsangs, currently known with its working title Kissed From Within.

There were 4 translations of *Before I Am* and 2 translations of *Writing on Water* published in 2015. These books were published by other publishing houses, but Mooji Media Publications oversees the translation projects, including the Sangha team that translates and proofreads the work.

In addition to the translations that have been published in 2015, there are currently 20 translation projects actively underway into 19 different languages.

#### Satsang Shop

The Satsang Shop is an online shop where people from all over the world are provided with the opportunity to purchase (in physical or downloadable format) Satsang products focused on the message shared by Sri Mooji. These products include:

Recorded and transcribed Satsangs
Satsang music
Guided Meditations by Sri Mooji
Books written by Sri Mooji and other Advaita Vedanta teachers
Images of Sri Mooji.

All of these products offer support for continued Satsang for all, especially those who are not able to be in the physical proximity of the Sri Mooji.

#### Mooji.TV

Mooji.TV is the home of all video and audio recordings of Satsangs with Mooji online. This website offers a substantial and growing searchable collection of free audio and video recordings. All online retreats and free Sunday Satsangs, (where you can sit in real time with Sri Mooji from home) are broadcast through Mooji.TV.

Mooji TV also offers a new video subscription channel of spontaneous talks with Sri Mooji called Sahaja Express. In general, there are 3 videos uploaded onto Sahaja Express channel every week. Until the end of 2015, there were 237 videos uploaded onto this channel. 607 people subscribed to Sahaja Express at the end of 2015.

#### 6. Future Projects

At the heart of everything that Mooji Foundation Ltd does is the desire to make the teachings as accessible as possible and in as many forms as possible, be it physically or online. As an organisation, we are open for changes as long as this furthers our objectives.

Below are the main future activities and projects for Mooji Foundation Ltd:

#### Events and Broadcasts

Alongside the Sunday Satsangs and Tea Satsangs held at Monte Sahaja almost weekly, we aim to hold the following:

- 5 weeks of free Satsangs in Rishikesh, India, in conjunction with Buddleia Media Pvt Ltd (February & March 2016)
- 2 Silent Retreats in Portugal at Zmar Eco Resort & Spa (May & October 2016)
- 2 Satsangs in Lisbon, Portugal (July, 2016)
- 1 Satsang in London, UK (July, 2016)
- 1 two-day Satsang Intensive with Sri Mooji in London, UK (July 2016)

- 1 Yoga Festival in Reading, UK where Sri Mooji has been invited to open the event and speak. (July 2016)
- 2 Satsangs in Italy (July, 2016)
- 2 silent retreats held by Associacao Mooji Sangha in Portugal at Monte Sahaja. (August & September 2016).

The many events organised will continue to be broadcast internationally and we will continue to explore new ways in which broadcasts can reach wider audiences.

#### Digital Library

With the volume of teachings, a project is being considered on how to most efficiently and effectively preserve the teachings so they are accessible. A digital library will be explored for this purpose. This has been an on-going project over the years due to the vast amounts of material that we have.

### Mooji International Sangha and Mooji Dana Teams

Our intention is to continue developing the work of these two teams in 2016. We will use the beginning of the year to establish new staff in key positions as both teams have expanded again since 2014 and 2015. In addition, we will develop a volunteering program, which will greatly support our work. This will allow volunteers from all over the world to visit our headquarters in London and participate fully in our projects and activities.

#### Collaboration with other Organisations

Mooji Foundation Ltd will continue its collaboration with affiliated Mooji organisations, i.e. Buddleia Media Pvt Ltd, our trading company Mooji Media Ltd and Associação Mooji Sangha.

We will continue to support the Associação Mooji Sangha (ASMS) financially through grants. During 2013 and 2014, we were closely supporting Associação Mooji Sangha through these grants and providing active guidance as it was a newly formed organisation. In 2015 Mooji Foundation Ltd found a need to continue in its involvement as we provided a grant to purchase new land as an extension to the Monte Sahaja Ashram. The Trustees foresee that Mooji Foundation Ltd will actively continue to support this project and the Ashram's needs over the next few years and this is reflected in our accounts. We feel that Portugal is where the teachings are alive.

We also anticipate that our sister company, Associação Mooji Sangha will have a stronger income of funds as they begin to facilitate more of their own events and Mooji Foundation Ltd, would like to continue to support them to be able to do so.

Structures, guidelines and procedures have been and are continually updated and improved upon to ensure that our grants are used solely to further our charitable objectives.

#### ANNEX I: CONTEXT AND DEFINITION OF MOST IMPORTANT TERMS

Advaita Vedanta, Sri Mooji, Satsang, Self-Inquiry, and Seva are, generally speaking, all that Mooji Foundation Ltd is about.

What do these terms mean and who is Sri Mooji?

Advaita Vedanta is an ancient school of Hindu philosophy and is one of the oldest and strongest philosophical traditions that are still alive today. Advaita is a Sanskrit word that means 'not-two' or 'non-dual'. Vedanta refers to the collection of Vedic texts (the Upanishads) from which some of the earliest central religious concepts of Hinduism emerged.

The philosophy of Advaita Vedanta is that our perception of ourselves as separate individuals sharing life on this planet with other human beings and creatures is just an idea, a thought of separation that arises inside a subtler space of unchanging awareness. This awareness space is the essential truth of who we are, and to realise this as living truth beyond just mental understanding is known as self-realisation.

In relation to Advaita Vedanta, Sri Mooji (Anthony Paul Moo-Young) is a direct disciple of Sri H.W.L. Poonja (Sri Papaji) (1910–1997), who, in turn, was a direct disciple of the great Advaita Vedanta Master Sri Ramana Maharshi (1879–1950).

Sri Mooji was born on the 29th of January 1954 in Port Antonio, Jamaica. He later moved to Brixton, London, where he lived for over 40 years. A major shift in perception that happened after an encounter with a Christian mystic in 1987 prompted Sri Mooji to travel to India in 1993. There, seemingly by chance, he met his Master, Sri Papaji, who was to finally uproot any remnants of a still functioning ego.

Since 1999, Sri Mooji has been sharing Satsang in the form of spontaneous encounters, open discourses, retreats and intensives with the many seekers from all over the world who are searching for the direct experience of Truth and who feel a connection with him. In response to this urge for the sharing of Satsang, Monte Sahaja, a retreat centre in Portugal, was established in 2011 and has been growing and developing since then in its function to share these teachings.

Sri Mooji was one of the founders of Mooji Foundation Ltd and currently acts as a patron of the organisation, actively supporting and guiding the activities of Mooji Foundation Ltd as needed.

Satsang, Self-inquiry, Sangha, and Seva are central to the activities of Mooji Foundation Ltd and they all support the same endeavour of a seeker. These terms are defined here below:

Satsang is a Sanskrit word which literally means 'association with the highest Truth'. Traditionally, Satsang would mean to sit in the physical presence of a Master. In modern times it is possible to be with a Master via the internet and other media including YouTubes, podcasts, and online live broadcasts.

The understanding, clarity and wisdom of one who has realised his true nature can help others to also come swiftly and directly into their own direct seeing of the Truth. In Satsang, one's

own introspection, reflection and inquiry is guided by the Master to the point where questions cease to be and one's true being is revealed as what is natural and always here. For Mooji Foundation Ltd, Satsang goes beyond a formal gathering where teachings are verbally imparted. It is a way of moving in life — and is life itself. Satsang is a teaching, a power greater than only a physical form or verbal sharing.

Mooji Foundation Ltd organises Satsangs with Sri Mooji. These can take various forms: Spontaneous Satsangs (where teachings are given by Sri Mooji spontaneously), Open Satsangs (one-off Satsangs which are free and open to all to come and participate), Sunday Satsangs, (Open Satsangs, which take place on Sundays), Tea Satsangs (Open Satsangs, where Sri Mooji answers questions written in by people), Language Satsangs (Satsangs which are translated live).

Self-inquiry is a practice of self-investigation which Sri Mooji uses as did Sri Ramana Maharshi before him. This introspection is the most efficient tool to finding out what 'I' truly is. By looking for the 'I' sense inside ourselves, we quickly discover that this 'I' cannot be found as we generally conceive of it. 'I' is not a tangible entity, as we have believed, but is recognised to be formless presence. The entity we imagined we were is now exposed as a mere illusory thought construct. As a result of this discovery, the suffering, which is common to the human experience, ceases. Sri Mooji uses self-inquiry to guide one into this recognition with dazzling clarity, love and authority. His style is direct, clear, compassionate and humorous.

Self-realisation is the recognition of one's true nature beyond the confines of conditioned identity.

Sangha is a Sanskrit word meaning association, assembly, company or community. International Sangha is here referred to as the community of all those, anywhere in the world and of different cultures, religion, nationality, age, gender, drawn to the teachings of Sri Mooji.

Seva is a Sanskrit word which means selfless service. In Hindu culture, Seva is regarded as a spiritual practice. It is an attitude and expression of moving and serving in life without expecting something in return, but simply for the privilege and joy of it. This is the spirit in which Mooji Foundation Ltd was formed and continues to function.

Dana is synonymous with Seva, connected to Hinduism and Buddhism it points to the inherent oneness between giving and receiving, often associated with donations in money or goods. Dana can also be an expression of Seva in the form of showing gratitude towards the teacher and supporting and enabling others in the continued availability of Satsang.

#### 1 Statement of Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

#### 1.1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2015 (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Mooji Foundation Ltd meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost of transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the group. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound.

The charity has adopted FRS 102 for the first time when preparing these financial statements. The transition date to FRS 102 was 1 January 2014 and the last financial statements prepared under the previous financial reporting framework were prepared for the year ended 31 December 2014. An explanation and reconciliation of how the transition has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is provided in note 22 to the financial statements.

A prior period adjustment has been made in respect of accruals held within the trading subsidiary for equipment not purchased. The impact on the balance sheet of the group as at 31 December 2014 has been to reduce accruals and increase reserves by £29,780.

The categories of income and expenditure disclosed within the financial statements have been reassessed in the year and have been presented in a different format this year with comparatives being restated for comparative purposes. This has no impact upon net movements.

#### 1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the restatement of comparative items was required. No restatement of items was required in either the balance sheet as at 1 January 2014, the date of transition, or as at 31 December 2014.

#### 1.3 Going Concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements and have no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### 1.4 Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its whole owned subsidiary Mooji Media Limited on a line-by-line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities and Income and Expenditure Account for the charity has not been presented because the charity has taken advantage of the exemption afforded by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

#### 15 Income

All income in the Statement of Financial Activities is shown gross of the associated costs and is accounted for where there is entitlement to the income, it is probable that the benefits associated with it will flow to the charity and it can be reliably measured. The following accounting policies are applied to income:

#### Donations and legacies

Donations and all other receipts from fundraising are reported gross and are accounted for on a receivable basis.

#### 1.6 Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been allocated on the bases indicated below:

#### Expenditure on raising funds

Costs of raising funds comprises the costs associated with the trading subsidiary.

#### Expenditure on charitable activities

These costs include expenditure associated with the delivery of the objects of the charity and include both the direct costs, support costs and grant funding relating to these activities.

#### Other expenditure

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees' meetings and reimbursed expenses.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT which is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

#### 1 Statement of Accounting Policies (continued)

#### 1.7 Tangible fixed assets

All assets acquired for continuing use by the charity are initially capitalised at cost and measured subsequently at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment Motor vehicles 33% straight line 33% straight line

#### 1.8 Fixed asset investments

Interests in subsidiaries, where donated are initially measured at the fair value of the gifted investment and subsequently measured at deemed cost less any accumulated impairment losses. The investments are assessed for impairment at each reporting date and any impairment losses or reversals of impairment losses are recognised immediately in the Statement of Financial Activities.

A subsidiary is an entity controlled by the charity. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

#### 1.8 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost comprises direct materials and where applicable direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the stocks to their present location and condition.

At each reporting date, an assessment is made for impairment. Any excess of the carrying amount of stocks over its estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell is recognised as an impairment loss in the Statement of Financial Activities.

#### 19 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

#### 1.10 Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

The group only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 1.11 Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

#### 1.12 Foreign exchange

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. At each reporting end date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the reporting en date. Gains and losses arising on translation are included in the Statement of Financial Activities for the period.

#### 1.13 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, though the trustees have directed that a reserve fund built up from general unrestricted funds, equal to six months' budgeted operating expenditure of the charity to meet the working capital requirements of the charity to enable the continuing of the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding. The value of such a fund will vary with activity levels and at the year end the unrestricted designated reserve stands at the estimated requirement of £60,000.

#### 1.14 In kind funding/support

The charity benefits from the services of many thousands of voluntary hours and unclaimed out-of-pocket expenses by a very large number of supporters. In addition companies, organisations and individuals have, in many cases, provided the use of facilities, equipment and premises for various activities and meetings without charge. The value of such gifts in kind have not been estimated and included in the statement of financial activities as we are unable to measure the value of these gifts.

#### 2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

In the view of the trustees in applying the accounting policies adopted, no critical judgements were required that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements nor do any critical estimates or assumptions made carry a significant risk of material adjustment in the next financial year.

#### Associaco - Monte Sahaja Asham (AMSA)

Mooji Foundation commits to supporting AMSA financially and in other aspects of running the charity. It aims to work jointly at achieving the common aim of The promotion of moral and spiritual welfare for the public benefit.

One of the charity's trustees is also part of AMSA's board of directors: Martha Elena Cellejas Fonnegra. In 2014 Tiana Mangharam Harilela and Lars Ame Jones, also Trustees of Mooij Foundation Ltd, resigned the AMSA Board as practical involvement in setting up the organization is no longer required.

Grants are approved yearly after the study of a yearly plan and grants proposal. Arrangements are dependent on AMSA's needs and Mooji Foundation's financial position. The agreement is monitored quarterly through AMSA reports and Mooji Foundation Ltd makes amendments during the year. Grants were paid as per Note 8.

Anthony Paul Moo Young, the charity's patron, is owed £4,789 (2014: £4,789) by the subsidiary which is included within other creditors.

### 22 Transition to FRS 102

This is the first year that the group has prepared its financial statements under FRS 102. The last financial statements prepared under previous UK GAAP were for the year ended 31 December 2014 and the date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 January 2014. No restatements were required of the amounts presented under previous UK GAAP for the group's net expenditure for the financial year ended 31 December 2014 nor for its total funds at 1 January 2014 and 31 December 2014.

The following adjustments have also been made in order to comply with the new SORP (FRS 102) which have had no effect on total funds or the income and expenditure account, but which have affected the presentation of certain items in the financial statements. The main items were:

#### (i) Governance costs

Governance costs are no longer presented as a separate category of expenditure in the Statement of Financial Activities as they are now regarded as part of support costs which are allocated to the cost of activities undertaken by the charity.

#### (ii) Statement of cash flows

The adoption of FRS 102 has required presentation of a statement of cash flows into operating, investing and financing activities.
