### STRATEGIC REPORT

The directors in preparing this strategic report, have complied with s414c of the Companies Act 2006.

### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

During the year, the company continued to act as a holding company for UK subsidiaries within the Werner group. The directors are not aware, at the date of this report, of any planned significant changes in the company's activities in the next twelve months. The performance of Werner Sales & Distribution Ltd is in line with expectations. The investment within the Youngman Group Ltd was impaired in the current year as a result of an impairment assessment performed by the company.

The company does not trade but incurred a loss in the year as a result of investment impairment and interest on intercompany loans which in turn increases the Company's net liability position.

#### FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

The main risk which the Company is exposed to is liquidity risk and cashflow risk.

Liquidity risk

The Company has no debt due to third parties outside of the group headed by Willa MidCo. S.à.r.l., the ultimate parent company. The Company has access to funds provided through intercompany loans. The liquidity risk is minimal.

Cashflow risk

Cashflow risk is managed at a group level above this company and is mitigated through the letter of support that is obtained by the directors.

### FINANCIAL KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS ("KPIs")

The company is an intermediate holding company and as such, the directors do not consider there to be any key performance indicators relevant to the business. Key performance indicators are assessed at the trading entity level and at the consolidated group level.

### **S172 DISCLOSURE**

With regard to the requirements of \$172 of the Companies Act 2006, the directors assert that they act in ways which they consider, in good faith, to be most likely to promote the success of the Company for the benefit of its members as a whole. In view of the above and having assessed the ability and willingness of this company to provide this support, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company will continue to have adequate resources for the foreseeable future being at least for the next twelve months from the approval of these financial statements. The Company therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

### Report on the audit of the financial statements

#### Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements of Werner Access Products UK Holdings Limited (the 'company'):

- give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs as at 31 December 2022 and of its loss for the year then ended:
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland"; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

We have audited the financial statements which comprise:

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 20202

### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Werner Access Products UK Holdings Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in the United Kingdom under the Companies Act 2006 and is registered in England and Wales. The entity is registered at The Causeway Maldon, Essex CM9 4LJ.

The ultimate holding and controlling company of Werner Access Products UK Holdings Limited during the year was Willa MidCo. S.a.r.l., a company registered in Luxembourg.

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The financial statements are presented in Sterling (£) and have been presented in round thousands (£'000).

Werner Access Products UK Holdings Limited meets the definition of a qualifying entity under FRS 102 and has therefore taken advantage of the disclosure exemptions available to it in respect of its financial statements. Exemptions have been taken in relation to financial instruments, presentation of a cash flow statement, intragroup transactions and remuneration of key management personnel.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies, see note 3 for further details.

The company does not have any employees (2021: nil).

### Going concern

Due to the net current liability position of £33.7m (2021 - £32.2m) and net liability position of £33.7m (2021 - £25.0m), the directors have obtained a letter of support from its ultimate parent company, Willa Midco S.a.r.l. that they will continue to provide funding and support to the company as required to ensure that it can continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future, being at least for the next twelve months from the approval of these financial statements.

In view of the above and having assessed the ability and willingness of this company to provide this support, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company will continue to have adequate resources for the foreseeable future being at least for the next twelve months from the approval of these financial statements. The Company therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

### **Group accounts**

The company has taken advantage of the exemption available under section 401 of the Companies Act 2006 from preparing consolidated accounts as it is a wholly owned subsidiary of Willa MidCo S.a.r.l., a company registered in Luxembourg, which itself prepares consolidated financial statements.

### Valuation of investments

Investments in subsidiaries are measured at cost less accumulated impairment.

## Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

#### Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade payables or receivables, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Profit and loss account.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the balance sheet date.

In the Company balance sheet, investments in subsidiaries and associates are measured at cost less impairment. For investments in subsidiaries acquired for consideration including the issue of shares qualifying for merger relief, cost is measured by reference to the nominal value of the shares issued plus fair value of other consideration. Any premium is ignored.

### Impairment of assets

Assets, other than those measured at fair value, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each balance sheet date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss as described below.

### Non-financial assets

An asset is impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after initial recognition, the estimated recoverable value of the asset has been reduced. The recoverable amount of an asset is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use.

The recoverable amount of goodwill is derived from measurement of the present value of the future cash flows of the cash-generating units of which the goodwill is a part. Any impairment loss in respect of a CGU is allocated first to the goodwill attached to that CGU, and then to other assets within that CGU on a pro-rata basis.

Where indicators exist for a decrease in impairment loss previously recognised for assets other than goodwill, the prior impairment loss is tested to determine reversal. An impairment loss is reversed on an individual impaired asset to the extent that the revised recoverable value does not lead to a revised carrying amount higher than the carrying value had no impairment been recognised. Where a reversal of impairment occurs in respect of a CGU, the reversal is applied first to the assets of the CGU, except for goodwill, on a pro-rata basis. Impairment of goodwill is never reversed.

## Impairment of assets (continued)

### Financial assets

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of an impairment is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the best estimate of the amount that would be received for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

Where indicators exist for a decrease in impairment loss, and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the prior impairment loss is tested to determine reversal. An impairment loss is reversed on an individual impaired financial asset to the extent that the revised recoverable value does not lead to a revised carrying amount higher than the carrying value had no impairment been recognised.

### Foreign currency translation

### Functional and presentation currency

The company's functional and presentational currency is considered to be pounds sterling because that is the currency of the primary economic area in which the Company operates.

#### Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the spot exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

At each period end foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. Non-monetary items measured at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction and non-monetary items measured at fair value are measured using the exchange rate when fair value was determined.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Profit and loss account except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

Foreign exchange gains and losses that relate to borrowings and cash and cash equivalents are presented in the Profit and loss account within 'finance income or costs'. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the Profit and loss account within 'other operating income'.

### Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the Profit and loss account over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

### **Borrowing costs**

All borrowing costs are recognised in the Profit and loss account in the year in which they are incurred.

### Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are discussed below.

Investments are reviewed for indicators of impairment annually, and where indicators exist, a full impairment review is performed. These reviews require estimates on the future revenue and profitability of the underlying business and discount factors applied to future cash flows in determining whether any impairment should be recognised. ### 14. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

On March 15, 2023, the Consolidated Group, JPMorgan Chase Bank (as Administrative Agent and Collateral Agent), and the Shareholder executed an Amendment to the Group's existing Term Loan Credit Agreement. This amendment resulted in an increase to the Consolidated Group's external debt, which will also result in an increase to an intercompany loan between Werner FinCo LP and a subsidiary of the Company, but this will not directly impact the financial statements of the Company.
