With the average person carrying less cash in their pockets than ever before, buskers are finding it increasingly difficult to survive. This is compounded by councils across the UK using legislation ban busking. The Busking Project enables street performers to receive secure mobile payments, get hired for events all over the world and find resources that will help them to defend their right to busk.

During the 2017-2018 financial year, aside from making hundreds of improvements to our systems, we created two new features on our platform:

"Busking Zones". These were geographically predefined areas (as big as a whole city, or just a specific busking pitch, like Covent Garden) that would display the buskers who are performing there, the day's schedule, information about the local area/festival/pitch, with everything clickable so you could easily donate to performers.

We used a busking zone at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, scheduling 205 shows per day for 28 days. Street performers were discovered through the web page, and buskers were tipped. We are hoping to use more of these zones in the future, and partnered with the Manchester Institute of Place Management to try to reach urbanists and BIDs who might want to use this technology.

"Events Board". We developed a complicated hiring platform that enables clients to post jobs (like corporate events or parties) with specifications that buskers can then apply to. For clients who didn't want to make their events 'public', the system also enabled us to hand-select street performers for 'private' events. We now book thousands of pounds worth of events every week.

We also spent a lot of time upgrading the design and features on the site to make it look more professional. The result is more users, more registered street performers and more tips to buskers through their profiles.

The company's stakeholders are street performers, fans of street performers, people looking to hire buskers and academic researchers. Nick Broad (one of the directors) has filmed and interviewed hundreds of street performers, is a member of most (if not all) the online busker social groups, and stays up to date with a number of busker advocates and activists around the UK. He and Liliana Maz (another director) have been working with street performers on this technology, continually getting feedback on surveys, social media and through a mailing list since 2014.

Our research over this time has enabled us to identify that there are probably over 1,000 street performers in London alone, and thousands more across the country. They are all facing the same challenges. 12 councils have already used PSPOs to ban busking, and more are on their way. And fewer people than ever before are carrying cash.

We listen to street performers' suggestions for features, we ask for feedback when we're developing new ideas, and, as with any online service, we track how the site is being used and update it accordingly – learning from buskers' actions what they want from the site and reacting to that.
