DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The Directors present their annual report together with the accounts and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2021 to 31 August 2022.

The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The Trust currently operates two primary and one secondary academies across Blackpool. Its academies have combined capacity of 1,678 and students on roll of 1,690 in the school census of January 2022.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust ("The Trust") is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Trust.

The charitable company is known as The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust.

The Directors are the trustees of The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust and are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. Details of the Directors who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the Charitable Company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Charitable Company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Directors' indemnities

The trust has purchased indemnity insurance to protect Directors and officers from claims arising in connection with academy business. The insurance provides cover of up to £10,000,000 on any one claim.

Induction training is provided by a National Leader of Governance and ongoing training is provided through an external Clerking Service provided by the Local Authority.

Organisational structure

The Trust was formed on the 1 September 2014 from Christ the King Catholic Primary School, St Cuthbert's Catholic Primary School and St Mary's Catholic College. As part of a coherent vision to act together in a deep partnership, the trust was formed with a single Board, a Chief Executive Officer and no local governing bodies. Two of the academies were convertors and the other a sponsored academy. The Trust is open to other Catholic schools joining as determined and agreed by the Lancaster RC Diocese Trustees.

The Trust is governed by its Board of Directors, whose members are Directors of the charitable company for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006 and Trustees for the purposes of charity legislation. From 1 January 2022, and in line with Diocese future trust growth plans, 2 local governing bodies were formed – one with shared governors for Christ the King and St. Cuthbert's Catholic Academies with the other being for St. Mary's Catholic Academy. The organisational structure of the Trust consists of 5 levels: the Board of Directors, the Chief Executive Officer, the Local Governing Body, the Headteachers and the Senior Leadership Team.

The Board of Directors is responsible for setting general policies, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring performance using results and making major decisions about the direction of the Trust, capital expenditure and, appointing senior staff. Certain elements of these responsibilities are delegated to the following sub committees who make recommendations to the Board of Directors:

- · Finance, Staffing & Premises Committee
- · Audit & Risk Committee
- · Standards Committee
- Ethos & Community Committee
- · Pay Committee

The Chief Executive Officer is also the Accounting Officer and has responsibility for managing the academies at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the Directors and reporting back to them with the support of the Senior Leadership Team comprising the Headteachers in the individual academies.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The Directors consider the Board of Directors, who are the Trust's Trustees, the Chief Executive Officer, the Headteachers and the Trust Business Manager comprise the key management personnel of the company in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the Trust on a day to day basis. Details of Directors' expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in note 11 to the accounts. The pay of the Chief Executive Officer, Headteachers and the Chief Finance Officer is reviewed annually and normally increased in line with the recommendations of the School Teachers' Review Body and the National Joint Council for Local Government Services respectively.

Engagement with employees

Objects and aims

The principal object and activity of the Trust as set out in its governing document is to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing Catholic schools designated as such ("the Academies") which shall offer a broad and balanced curriculum and shall be conducted in accordance with the principles, practices and tenets of the Catholic Church and all Catholic canon law applying thereto including any trust deed governing the use of land used by an academy both generally and in particular in relation to arranging for religious education and daily acts of worship and having regard to any advice and following directives issued by the Diocesan Bishop.

Objectives, strategies and activities

The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust's mission is for all Catholic schools to work together to:

- Develop excellence By providing the best possible opportunities for every child through consistently delivering a high-quality education;
- Build strong communities By providing a support and service to our families, parishes and wider communities, with an unrelenting focus on those most disadvantaged and vulnerable in our society;
- With Gospel values at the heart of all we do We will invest in the ongoing professional training and development for the whole Trust community, with Christ at the centre.

The core principles of the Trust are to educate the whole person, aiming for excellence and working together for the Common Good. Through collective responsibility, united in our Catholic faith, the Trust strives to enable each school to thrive spiritually, academically and financially so that all of the children and young people can 'belong, engage and become' – and reach their full potential by realising their God-given talents.

The main objectives for the year were:

- · Develop and implement a broad and ambitious curriculum from EYFS to post 16
- · Improve outcomes and opportunities for disadvantaged pupils
- Develop and implement a professional development programme for all staff across the Trust
- · Further develop and implement well-being strategies for staff and pupils across the Trust
- To further develop a trust-wide understanding of ethos for all stakeholders
- To develop a Trust growth and development strategy (incorporating the Diocesan strategy).

The Trust works in partnership as one family of schools, whilst maintaining and celebrating the uniqueness of each individual school and the community it serves. We are a values-driven Trust. Our core values of Trust, Respect, Faith, Hope and Service are our hallmarks. These values underpin all of our relationships; between staff, pupils, families, our wider parishes and local communities.

Public benefit

The Directors are aware of the Charity Commission Guidance on providing public benefit and have had due regard to this in exercising their duties during the year. The main public benefit delivered by the Trust is the provision of a high quality of education to its students. This has been evidenced through the results achieved and feedback from external assessments.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

Attainment and progress results are consistently at or above national averages at Christ the King and St. Cuthbert's Catholic Academy, indicating the high quality of work being done across both primary academies.

Both academies have been inspected by Ofsted and graded as "good". St. Cuthbert's is graded as "good" in its Section 48 Denominational Inspection; outstanding in "Capacity for Improvement" and "How well leaders and managers monitor and evaluate the provision for Religious Education". Christ the King is graded as outstanding in its Section 48 Denominational Inspection.

Christ the King Catholic Academy

Data from 2022 shows that in all measures at Key Stage 2, pupils are achieving higher than the national average – this includes Reading, Mathematics, Writing, the combined measure of RWM, and SPaG (Spelling, punctuation and grammar).

2022 outcomes can be seen in the table. The only areas were attainment falls below national average is at KS1 (teacher assessed) reading and writing. The impact of the pandemic was particularly marked for younger children and their language development, particularly for disadvantaged children. These areas are a key focus in the Academy improvement plan for the following academic year. The proportion of children who achieved a good level of development at the end of EYFS is just below the national average but this still represents strong progress based on the baseline of children when they started.

The Key Stage 2 results were excellent at Christ the King, and were mostly well above national averages.

St Cuthbert's Catholic Academy

Data from 2022 shows a similarly extremely positive picture for St. Cuthbert's Catholic Academy. Again, the proportion of pupils achieving a good level of development at the end of the Reception year is just below the national average but this represents good progress from their low starting points. At key stage 1, in all measures, pupils are achieving in line with the national average for Reading, Mathematics and Writing.

At Key Stage 2, pupils at St. Cuthbert's significantly outperformed their peers nationally. In Reading, Mathematics, Writing, the combined measure of RWM, and SPaG (Spelling, punctuation and grammar), pupils achieved well above the national averages.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

St Mary's Catholic Academy

This was the first year that students' grades were decided by externally marked examinations and coursework since 2019. There were some mitigations for students with pre-release of revision topics and the removal of some parts of the assessments for students. Comparisons to 2020 and 2021 are difficult as these grades were decided by CAGs so any comparisons will be drawn to 2019 GCSE data.

GCSE Measures 2020 Unvalidated and based on CAGs:

English & Mathematics at Level 4+ = 63.1% (2019 - 59.6%) – this is higher attainment in 2022 for this measure

English & Mathematics at Level 5+ = 37.9% (2019 - 36.0%) – this is higher attainment in 2022 for this measure

Attainment 8 Point Score = 44.46 (2019 - 45.00) - this is a slight drop in this measure from 2019.

Progress 8 is -0.61 (2019 -0.25). This is one third of a grade lower than 2019. This measure is affected by the pandemic and it needs to be taken into account that due to the uneven effects of the pandemic, comparisons cannot be made to other schools. National research carried out by the University of Nottingham shows that areas such as Blackpool and 'The local authorities which have been hardest hit by Covid-19 in England are Blackpool and Great Yarmouth, where the pandemic has compounded the effects of underlying deprivation.' The effects of this can be seen in the progress scores, attendance and persistent absence of students following return from the pandemic closures.

Results in Sixth Form showed a good proportion of students making strong progress from their GCSE baseline. Students achieved 96% pass rate at A2 level, with 17.4% of the grades achieved were A*-A grades – this represents a small drop from 2019. 36.3% of grades were achieved at A*-B, compared to 50% in 2019. Progress measures were calculated as grade 7 ALPS. This demonstrates that whilst a good proportion of students made strong progress, there was a significant cohort of students who did not reach their target grades.

Attainment in level 3 vocational qualifications was solid, with slightly fewer top grades of Distinction * and Distinctions. Given the impact of the pandemic, an ALPS score of 5 overall for vocational subjects is pleasing.

Following the pandemic, the business model of key performance indicators (KPIs) was maintained from the previous year due to the priorities still being ongoing as a result of interruption from the pandemic. Whilst these KPIs were maintained across the Trust, the Trust also focused on the following areas:

- · ensuring a safe return to learning for staff and pupils across the Trust
- · promoting and supporting the health and wellbeing of students and staff
- · maintaining strong working relationships with the Regional Schools Commissioner and the DfE
- · developing strong relationships with the local family of Catholic schools
- · developing a model of local governance for the schools in the Trust
- developing an effective growth strategy aligned with the Lancaster Diocesan plan for academisation
- growing the Trust and increasing by 133% the number of schools in the Trust for 2022-2023.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Directors has a reasonable expectation that the academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Financial review

The Trust's total incoming resources during the year were £12,010,873. The majority of the Trust's income derives from central government funding via the Education and Skills Funding Agency, in the form of government grants. Total funding received for the Trust's educational operations in the period was £11,808,936 and further details are provided in note 4 to the accounts.

Total outgoing resources for the year were £12,153,976. All of the Trust's expenditure related to the direct provision of educational operations. The excess of expenditure over income was £143,103.

At the period end the Trust's total reserves were in surplus by £445,753.. This included the deficit on the Local Government Pension Scheme of £1,274,000. Excluding this balance leaves positive funds of £1,719,753 including unrestricted funds of £1,090,668, restricted fixed assets of £218,946 and other restricted funds of £410,139.

At 31 August 2022 all assets shown in the accounts were used exclusively for providing education and associated support services to students of the Trust.

On conversion the Trust inherited a deficit of £1,758,000 in respect of the Local Government Pension Scheme, which many of the non-teaching staff belong to. This deficit has decreased to £1,274,000 by 31 August 2022, mainly due to changes in actuarial assumptions regarding future returns on investments and the present value of future liabilities. The Trust does not have an obligation to settle this liability immediately and there are no indications that it will crystallise in the foreseeable future. Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding local government pension scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013. The Trust has entered into an agreement to make contributions towards the deficit of £130,900 between April 2022 and March 2023.

Reserves policy

Reserves are required to-

- Ensure sustainability of the school in the event of reductions in funding, reductions in pupil numbers or unexpected increases in expenditure.
- · Fund capital projects and the replacement of equipment
- Enable the Trust to respond to opportunities and implement the longer term strategic plan.

Total restricted GAG funds and unrestricted funds amounted to £1,306,997 at 31 August 2022.

Restricted GAG reserves

The Directors have considered the level of GAG reserves which they believe will provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between the spending and receipt of grants and unexpected or planned future revenue and capital costs. The Directors believe that, under normal circumstances, the appropriate level of GAG reserve should be between 3% and 5% of GAG income and aim to keep the reserve within these parameters. At 31 August 2022 the Trust held GAG reserves of £216,329, which represents 2.4% of the GAG income for the period.

Unrestricted reserves

In addition to the GAG reserve, which can only be utilised for the restricted purposes set out in the Funding Agreement, the Trust holds unrestricted free reserves, which provide additional working capital and are not committed or designated. It is the Directors' policy to aim to hold approximately one months' expenditure in unrestricted reserves, to provide an additional cushion over and above the restricted GAG reserve. At 31 August 2022 the level of unrestricted reserves held was £1,090,668 which is materially within the policy.

Investment policy

The Directors, having due regard to the Charity Commission guidance have approved an Investment Policy delegating the day-to-day management of investments to the Trust Business Manager within the guidelines of the policy. The Trust does not currently hold any investments other than cash, which is held for its normal operations. The Board of Directors has adopted a low risk strategy to its cash holdings and will only invest in low risk deposit accounts. The aim of the policy is to ensure funds that the Trust does not immediately need to cover anticipated expenditure are invested in such a way as to maximise the Trust's investment return with acceptable risk.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the Trust is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage the identified risks effectively. A risk register is maintained in which identified risks are recorded which are reported to the Board at each of their meetings. A review of the Trust's risk management processes will be undertaken on an annual basis and key controls will be continually improved.

The Directors identified the key risks as standards and curriculum development at the academies, the long term impact of low school funding levels against a backdrop of increased costs in particular around energy and staffing costs and the numbers of pupils on roll at one of the academies.

The internal financial systems are based on the Academy Trust Handbook and are documented in the Financial Regulations. The systems are based on a framework of segregation of duties, schemes of delegation which include authorisation and approval. Financial management information is provided to the Board of Directors on a termly basis and the Chair of Directors receives a monthly update.

The responsible officer role has been performed during the period by Shard Business Services and three reports have been presented to the Directors. No major issues have been identified. Recommendations for the improvements to systems and procedures have already been implemented or are in the process of being implemented.

Fundraising

Under the provisions of the Charities (Protection and Social Investment) Act 2016 this section must include information on fundraising practices.

The Trust undertakes a small amount of fundraising partly to fund projects within individual academies for example to provide laptops to pupils or to raise funds to pass on to other charities. We contact parents by letter to raise awareness of the fundraising no more than once per year and by text message prior to any specific event, for example a non-uniform day to raise funds for local charities.

We do not work with any commercial participators or professional fundraisers and have received no complaints about our fundraising. We believe that the small amount of fundraising undertaken is not unreasonably intrusive or persistent and there is no undue pressure placed on parents to donate.

Plans for future periods

The next academic year will see a continuation of the work to improve standards and deliver an extensive challenging curriculum and best practice in teaching and learning. Across the Trust we will:

- Develop and implement a broad and ambitious curriculum from EYFS to post-16;
- · Achieve excellence for pupils in all areas;
- Continue to improve the education of the whole child (John 10:10)
- · Further develop and implement well-being strategies for pupils and staff across the Trust
- Further develop a trust-wide understanding of ethos for all stakeholders
- · Develop the Trust in line with the Diocesan strategy.

The ambition of the Trust to grow aligns with the Diocesan plan of the Bishop of Lancaster. For the Blessed Edward Bamber CMAT (BEBCMAT), the proposed footprint covers 22 schools (3 schools currently in the Trust and 19 other schools across Blackpool, the Wyre and Fylde regions). These schools span two local authorities, Blackpool and Lancashire and will serve approximately 6500 learners.

BEBCMAT is committed to grow in line with the Bishop's vision for academisation through growth that is sustainable and ensures that the whole organisation benefits as new schools join. In order to do this, we have established a timeline for growth whereby the appropriate infrastructure is in place ahead of the new schools becoming part of the Trust.

We are committed to a growth strategy that is driven by guiding principles:

- Sustained performance for existing schools and strong schools coming in to the Trust
- . Building capacity and expertise to enable all schools to make rapid and sustainable progress through intelligently building school improvement and operational capacity
- · Balance maintaining balance between capacity-givers and those in need of support
- Growing excellent schools using our capacity for further improvements to continue to drive standards, particularly for disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils
- Strength in numbers achieving economies of scale through procurement and providing first-rate central office support
- Sound strategic oversight and governance controlled growth in line with the Bishop's vision and approved by the RSC with strong governance oversight at all levels.

Wave 1a of growth of the Trust will see 4 schools joining the Trust: St.Kentigern's Catholic Primary School, St.Mary's Catholic Primary School Great Eccleston, St. Teresa's Catholic Primary School and St. Wulstan's & St. Edmund's Catholic Primary School have joined the Trust in the Autumn term of 2022-2023 academic year. Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School are due to join the Trust in wave 1b, in the spring term of 2022-2023.

There are currently 2 schools which have committed to joining the Trust in waves 2 and 3, so there will be 12 schools remaining to convert over the coming years.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

Scope of responsibility

As Directors we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Board of Directors has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Chief Executive Officer, as Accounting Officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. They are also responsible for reporting to the Board of Directors any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

Conflicts of interest

Governance reviews

The remit of the board is to determine the vision and values of the Trust; support leadership in determining and fulfilling the strategic direction of the Trust; hold leadership to account and ensure staff well-being; and oversee the financial performance of the Trust ensuring there are systems in place to manage risk and ensure money is well spent.

The Trust board currently has strategic oversight of quality and standards across the three Trust schools. The board is satisfied with the quality of data it receives from the central leadership team and senior leadership team across the Trust.

During the Autumn Term meeting of the Full board, the board of Directors met to review its strategy direction and also that its governance arrangements were fit for purpose. The Board of Directors also conducted an annual skills audit of the Board. The Trust will conduct its next self-evaluation in Autumn 2022 with a view to an external review of governance being undertaken in the academic year 2024-2025 once the trust has grown and is comprised of more local governing bodies.

During this year, the decision was taken to form two new local governing bodies (LGBs) for the schools in the Trust in preparation for growth. These LGBs came into effect in January 2022.

The finance, staffing and premises Committee is a sub-committee of the main Board of Directors. Its purpose is to:

- Maintain oversight of major financial issues concerning the Trust and its Academies, the overall Trust budget and those of the individual Academies, the management of funds against the budget, the benchmarking of financial performance, expenditure levels, budget headings and the way funds are utilised (including value for money) and the way monies are secured;
- To monitor the production, timeliness and accuracy of key financial statements in response to both statutory and local requirements;
- To support (recommending and advising) the Trust Board in developing and then implementing a reserves policy and to consider the impact of strain in individual Academy budgets;
- To support (recommending and advising) the Trust Board in developing and then implementing the Financial Regulations Manual and associated procurement policy Separate policy;
- To review tenders for major contracts as specified in the Financial Regulations Manual. To approve or reject tender proposals or, where required, make recommendations to the Trust Board;
- To recommend any changes in the Financial Policy, where significant, to the Trust Board. To review
 the operations of the Trust and the Academies in relation to the procedures shown in the Finance
 Policy;
- To monitor key financial and accounting systems and reviewing any audits of these or the general finances of the Trust and make recommendations to the Trust Board and/or the Local governing bodies as appropriate.

Review of value for money

As Accounting Officer the Chief Executive Officer has responsibility for ensuring that the trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The Accounting Officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The Accounting Officer considers how the Trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the Board of Directors where value for money can be improved including the use of benchmarking data where available. The Accounting Officer for the Trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- Undertaking a competitive tender procedure for the procurement of a new Finance and Budgeting accounting system to deliver a high quality, cost-effective and cloud based system across the Trust sites
- Undertaking a competitive tender procedure for the procurement of a new HR system and support company
- · Undertake a competitive tender procedure for the procurement of a new Payroll provider.
- Undertaking a competitive quoting procedure to identify a new trust Health and Safety support company.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can, therefore, only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of Trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in the Trust for the year ended 31 August 2022 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The Board of Directors has reviewed the key risks to which the trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Directors is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2021 to 31 August 2022 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Directors.

The risk and control framework

The trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Board of Directors;
- regular reviews by the Finance, Staffing and Premises Committee of reports which indicate financial
 performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure
 programmes;
- · setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- · identification and management of risks.

The Board of Directors has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided not to appoint its own internal auditor. The Directors have appointed Shard Business Services to carry out Internal Scrutiny reviews across the trust which also splits the internal and external audit functions in line with ethical requirements.

The reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the trust's financial systems and other areas identified within the trusts risk register. The checks carried out in the current period included:

- review of Human Resources processes and procedures
- · review of Procurement including systems and processes
- review of Cyber Security

On a termly basis, Shard Business Services reports to the Board of Directors, through the Audit and Risk Committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the Board of Directors' financial responsibilities.

The internal audit programme occurred as planned throughout the year in accordance with the Internal Assurance Programme of Works as agreed with the Audit and Risk Committee. The auditor issued individual assurance reports following the completion of each aspect of work. All recommendations have been resolved to address any issues raised in these reports with the exception of some of the Human Resources recommendations. The trust has employed a new HR system, support company and HR Officer from 1 September 2022 and a further review of Human Resources systems and processes will be made in the next academic year to allow new procedures to be implemented. All reports were submitted to the Audit & Risk committee with the management response included.

Review of effectiveness

As Accounting Officer the Chief Executive Officer has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · the work of the reviewer;
- · the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the audit committee and a plan to ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

1 Accounting policies

The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi Academy Trust is a charitable company, incorporated in England and Wales. The address of its principal place of business is given on page 1 and the nature of its operations are set out in the Directors' report.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts of the trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2021 to 2022 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Going concern

The Directors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, ie whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The Directors make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the accounts and have concluded that the trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the statement of financial activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where the receipt is probable and it can be measured reliably.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

The academy trust does not account for the value of donated facilities on the grounds that the market rent is not reasonably quantifiable and measurable.

Donated fixed assets

Donated fixed assets are measured at fair value unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor is used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the trust's accounting policies.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the trust apportioned to charitable activities.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

The academy trust company occupies the land and buildings which are owned by the Lancaster Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust. The trustees are the providers of the academies' land and buildings on the same basis as when the academies were maintained schools. The academy trust company occupies the land and buildings under a mere licence. This continuing permission of their trustees is pursuant to, and subject to, the trustees' charitable objects, and is part of the Catholic Church's contribution since 1847 to provide State funded education in partnership with the State. The licence delegates aspects of the management of the land and buildings to the academy trust company for the time being, but does not vest any rights over the land in the academy trust company. The trustees of the Lancaster Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust have given an undertaking to the Secretary of State that they will not give the academy trust company less than two years notice to terminate the occupation of the land or buildings. Having considered the factual matrix under which the academy trust company is occupying the land and buildings the directors have concluded that the value of the land and buildings occupied by the academy trust company will not be recognised on the balance sheet of the academy trust.

In addition, the academy trust inherited the fixtures and fittings and other tangible fixed assets in use by the three schools at the date of conversion. These assets had been held for a significant period of time and were fully depreciated. An estimate of the current fair value was not readily available and the cost of obtaining a valuation was considered to be disproportionate to the value of including such a valuation in the accounts. No value has therefore been included in the accounts for these assets. The insurance value of fixtures and fittings and other assets inherited on conversion was £6,313,364.

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding that require the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Computer equipment

3 years

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

5 years

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.6 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods of services it must provide.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

1.7 Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1.8 Financial instruments

The trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.9 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less further costs to completion and disposal. Provision is made for obsolete and slow moving stock.

1.10 Taxation

The trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.11 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high-quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income or expenditure are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.12 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the trust at the discretion of the Directors.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency/Department for Education.

1.13 Agency arrangements

The academy trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds from the ESFA. Payments received from the ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the trust does not have control over the charitable allocation of the funds. The income received and bursaries paid during the year and any balances held are disclosed in note 27.

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Useful economic life of tangible fixed assets

The useful economic life of tangible fixed assets is judged at the point of purchase. As standard, a useful economic life of 3 years is applied to computer equipment and 5 years to fixtures, fittings and equipment.

Impairment of fixed assets

At each balance sheet date, management undertake an assessment of the carrying value of tangible fixed assets to determine whether there is any indication that the value has been impaired. Where necessary, an impairment is recorded as an impairment loss.

Impairment of debtors

At each balance sheet date, management undertake a review of outstanding debtor balances and consider whether there is any indication of impairment or any balances requiring provision. This calculation is based on the financial position of the debtors, the payment history and any ongoing discussions.

Valuation of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 20, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2022. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Critical areas of judgement

Classification of occupied land and buildings owned by the Diocese

The academy trust occupies the land and buildings which are owned by the Lancaster Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust. The trustees are the providers of the academies' land and buildings on the same basis as when the academies were maintained schools. The academy trust company occupies the land and buildings under a licence. The land and buildings are not included in the accounts. Further information on the accounting treatment adopted can be found in the tangible fixed assets accounting policy.

Donated facilities

The market rent of the donated facilities is not reasonably quantifiable or measurable. As such, an estimate of the value of the donation (being the amount it would have to pay if renting the site on the open market) has not been recognised in the financial statements.

Classification of finance and operating leases

At the inception of each lease, management undertake an assessment of the terms of the lease including the payments to be made over the life of the lease, the fair value of the asset subject to the lease, the length of the lease and whether the terms of the lease transfer substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership. Based on this assessment, management will determine whether the lease should be classified as a finance or operating lease.

Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the trust was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2022.

General Annual Grant must be used for the normal running expenses of the trust and any amounts carried forward at the end of a financial period must be used in accordance with the terms of the Funding Agreement.

Other DfE/ESFA grants comprise additional funding received for the furtherance of education, which must be used in accordance with the specific terms of each grant.

Other government grants include Pupil Premium funding and grants received in respect of the nurseries and Children's Centre.

Other restricted funds include contributions received for school trips and non public donations.

The pension reserve represents the value of the trust's share of the deficit in the Local Government Pension Scheme. The value of the deficit inherited on conversion was £1,758,000 and this had decreased to £1,274,000 by 31 August 2022.

Restricted fixed asset funds include assets funded from capital grants and out of the GAG. Depreciation is to be charged against this fund each year.

20 Pension and similar obligations

The trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Lancashire County Pension Fund. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016, and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £166,057 (2021: £161,558) were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2022 and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academy trusts. All teachers have the option to opt out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary. These contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

Scheme Changes

The arrangements for a reformed Teachers' Pension Scheme, in line with the recommendations made by Lord Hutton, in particular the introduction of a Career Average Revalued Earnings (CARE) scheme, were implemented from 1 April 2015.

In December 2018, the Court of Appeal held that transitional protection provisions contained in the reformed judicial and firefighter pension schemes, introduced as part of public service pension reforms in 2015, gave rise to direct age discrimination and were therefore unlawful. The Supreme Court, in a decision made in June 2019, have rejected the Government's application for permission to appeal the Court of Appeal's ruling. The case will now be referred to an Employment Tribunal for a decision regarding the remedy which will need to be offered to those members of the two schemes who were subject of the age discrimination.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024.

The employer's pension costs paid to the TPS in the period amounted to £1,034,307 (2021: £998,601).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions are as noted below. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 18.1 to 18.7% for employers and 5.5 to 12.5% for employees.

The trust has entered into an agreement to make contributions towards the deficit of £130,900 between April 2022 and March 2023.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

24 Related party transactions

Owing to the nature of the trust's operations and the composition of the Board of Directors being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which the trust has an interest. All transactions involving such organisations are conducted at arm's length and in accordance with the trust's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures. The following related party transactions took place in the period of account:

During the period the trust received £9,845 revenue income (2021: £8,289) from The Diocese of Lancaster Education Service. Revenue income of £50 was outstanding at 31 August 2022 (2021: £218).

The academy trust paid a contribution towards governance support to The Diocese of Lancaster Education Service amounting to £20,256 (2021: £17,682), along with training and conference fees amounting to £1,500 (2021: £1,325) and building services support amounting to £nil (2021: £1,837). Revenue expenditure of £45 was unpaid at 31 August 2021 (2021: £45).

The transactions are in accordance with the academy trust's financial regulations. In entering into the transactions the academy trust has complied with the requirements of the ESFA's Academy Trust Handbook.

25 Post balance sheet events

26 Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before he or she ceases to be a member.

27 Agency arrangements

The trust distributes 16-19 bursary funds to students as an agent for the ESFA. In the accounting period ending 31 August 2022 the trust received £24,443 and disbursed £16,440 from the fund. An amount of £16,155 is included in other creditors relating to undistributed funds that are repayable to the ESFA.
