#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

#### Year ended 31 December 2021

#### 1. General information

The company is a private company limited by shares, registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Unit 8, The Matchworks, Speke Road, Garston, Liverpool, L19 2RF.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with Section 1A of FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland'.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

As forecast the company has continued to incur substantial losses in the year to 31 December 2021 as it continues to develop its products. The shareholders have agreed to continue to provide additional financial support to the company. Further investment of £1 million was received on 10th February 2022 along with £650,000 received on 12th August 2022. The directors are of the opinion that the company will continue to operate within the facilities currently available. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that would result from a withdrawal of this support.

#### Income tax

The taxation expense represents the aggregate amount of current and deferred tax recognised in the reporting period. Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences at the reporting date. Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference.

#### Foreign currencies

Foreign currency transactions are initially recorded in the functional currency, by applying the spot exchange rate as at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rate ruling at the reporting date, with any gains or losses being taken to the profit and loss account.

#### **Operating leases**

Lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

#### Intangible assets

Intangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and are subsequently stated at cost less impairment losses.

Patents are subject to an annual impairment review. As such no amortisation is charged in the accounts.

#### Research and development

Research expenditure is written off in the period in which it is incurred.

Development expenditure incurred is capitalised as an intangible asset only when all of the following criteria are met:

- It is technically feasible to complete the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale:
- There is the intention to complete the intangible asset and use or sell it;
- There is the ability to use or sell the intangible asset;
- The use or sale of the intangible asset will generate probable future economic benefits;
- There are adequate technical, financial and other resources available to complete the development and to use or sell the intangible asset; and
- The expenditure attributable to the intangible asset during its development can be measured reliably.

Expenditure that does not meet the above criteria is expensed as incurred.

#### Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

#### **Depreciation**

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

33% straight line

Equipment

### Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the company are assigned to those units.

#### Government grants

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the company will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognised using the accrual model and the performance model.

Under the accrual model, government grants relating to revenue are recognised on a systematic basis over the periods in which the company recognises the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate. Grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the entity with no future related costs are recognised in income in the period in which it becomes receivable.

Grants relating to assets are recognised in income on a systematic basis over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income and not deducted from the carrying amount of the asset.

Under the performance model, where the grant does not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income when the grant proceeds are received or receivable. Where the grant does impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions have been met. Where grants received are prior to satisfying the revenue recognition criteria, they are recognised as a liability.

#### Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, deposits with banks, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

#### **Defined contribution plans**

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

#### **Employee incentive plans**

Equity-settled share-based payment transactions are measured at fair value at the date of grant. The fair value is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, with a corresponding increase in equity. This is based upon the company's estimate of the shares or share options that will eventually vest which takes into account all vesting conditions and non-market performance conditions, with adjustments being made where new information indicates the number of shares or share options expected to vest differs from previous estimates.

Fair value is determined using an appropriate pricing model. All market conditions and non-vesting conditions are taken into account when estimating the fair value of the shares or share options. As long as all other vesting conditions are satisfied, no adjustment is made irrespective of whether market or non-vesting conditions are met.

Where the terms of an equity-settled transaction are modified, an expense is recognised as if-the terms had not been modified. In addition, an expense is recognised for any increase in the fair value of the transaction, as measured at the date of modification.

Where an equity-settled transaction is cancelled or settled, it is treated as if it had vested on the date of cancellation or settlement, and any expense not yet recognised in profit or loss is expensed immediately.

Cash-settled share-based payment transactions are measured at the fair value of the liability. Until the liability is settled, the fair value of the liability is re-measured at each reporting date and at the date of settlement, with any changes in fair value recognised in profit or loss for the period.

Other creditors comprise A ordinary shares which are redeemable, at the original subscription price of £6.2 million, at the request of the shareholders, at any time after May 2026. The shares attract a dividend at the rate of 8% per annum. The accumulated dividends will be paid when reserves are available. Accrued dividends to date of £1,686,274 are included in creditors due within one year.

#### 13. Employee incentive plans

The Company operates both an EMI share option plan and a share subject to claw back plan. Under both plans the maximum amount of shares that the Company may issue is 1,993,750 which are offered at a share or exercise price specified by the Directors at the date of grant and vest, or reverse vest over a specified time. The share or exercise price and vesting conditions of the share options are subject to approval by the Board of Directors. Share grants and share options are subject to good leaver/bad leaver provisions.

As at 31st December 2021 the Company had issued 1,320,000 EMI Share Options to its employees of which 338,099 had vested. As at 31st December 2021 the company had issued 651,250 share subject to claw back to its employees and contributors of which 181,327 shares had vested. Each award had a share or exercise price of £0.0001. The fair value of the shares subject to claw back issued was measured using the Black Scholes valuation model. The expected volatility of the growth shares was assessed at 50% and a risk-free rate of 0.5% due comparison with other similar stage investment backed enterprises. As a result of the fair value exercise performed a profit and loss charge of £146,481 was recorded in the accounts, with corresponding credits to equity.

#### 14. Prior period errors

During the preparation of the 2020 financial statements, it was identified that the preference share dividend accrual had been calculated based on the number of shares rather than subscription price. The 2019 dividend reduction was shown as a prior year adjustment. This resulted in a reduction of £148,529 to accruals as at 31 December 2019 and a corresponding reduction to the preference share dividend of that year.

After the year end the company completed an investment round to support ongoing activities with £1 million being received on 10th February 2022 and £650,000 received on 12th August 2022.

#### 17. Related party transactions

Mr MJ Dignum, a director and shareholder of the company, is a current director of Inter Scientific Limited, with which the company has a services agreement for the rental of machinery and consultancy services and the supply of business premises. During the year the company purchased services amounting to £29,732 from Inter Scientific Limited. The balance owed to Inter Scientific as at 31 December 2021 was £7,260. The company made supplies to Inter Scientific during the year of £25,934. Of this amount, £6,492 was receivable as at 31 December 2021.

#### 18. Controlling party

At the balance sheet date the company was under the control of Advent Life Sciences LLP as the majority shareholder.
