1 The company's name is "LUBAVITCH SYNAGOGUE" (and in this document it is called the charity)

INTERPRETATION

2 In the articles

address means a postal address or, for the purposes of electronic communication, a fax number, an e-mail or postal address or a telephone number for receiving text messages in each case registered with the charity,

the articles means the charity's articles of association,

the charity means the company intended to be regulated by the articles,

clear days in relation to the period of a notice means a period excluding

- · the day when the notice is given or deemed to be given, and
- . the day for which it is given or on which it is to take effect,

the Commission means the Charity Commission for England and Wales,

Companies Acts means the Companies Acts (as defined in section 2 of the Companies Act 2006) insofar as they apply to the charity,

the directors means the directors of the charity. The directors are charity trustees as defined by section 177 of the Charities Act 2011,

document includes, unless otherwise specified, any document sent or supplied in electronic form.

electronic form has the meaning given in section 1168 of the Companies Act 2006,

the memorandum means the charity's memorandum of association,

officers includes the directors and the secretary (if any),

the seal means the common seal of the charity if it has one,

secretary means any person appointed to perform the duties of the secretary of the charity,

the United Kingdom means Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and

words importing one gender shall include all genders, and the singular includes the plural and vice versa

Unless the context otherwise requires words or expressions contained in the articles have the same meaning as in the Companies Acts but excluding any statutory modification not in force when this constitution becomes binding on the charity

Apart from the exception mentioned in the previous paragraph a reference to an Act of Parliament includes any statutory modification or re-enactment of it for the time being in force

LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

- The liability of the members is limited to a sum not exceeding £10, being the amount that each member undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charity in the event of its being wound up while he, she or it is a member or within one year after he, she or it ceases to be a member, for
 - 3 1 payment of the charity's debts and liabilities incurred before he, she or it ceases to be a member;
 - 3 2 payment of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and
 - 3.3 adjustment of the rights of the contributories among themselves

OBJECTS

- 4 The chanty's objects (Objects) are specifically restricted to the following
 - 4.1 to advance the Jewish religion through the provision of a place of worship (Synagogue) for Jews in Stamford Hill, North London, where Divine Services are conducted and the religious, educational and social development of its members are fostered, and
 - 4 2 to advance the education of the public and of the Jewish community about Jewish culture, tradition and practices, through the provision of facilities for education at the synagogue and elsewhere

POWERS

- The charity has power to do anything which is calculated to further its Object(s) or is conducive or incidental to doing so. In particular, the charity has power
 - 5 1 to raise funds. In doing so, the chanty must not undertake any taxable permanent trading activity and must comply with any relevant statutory regulations,
 - to buy, take on lease or in exchange, hire or otherwise acquire any property and to maintain and equip it for use,
 - to sell, lease or otherwise dispose of all or any part of the property belonging to the chanty. In exercising this power, the chanty must comply as appropriate with sections 117 and 122 of the Chanties Act 2011,
 - to borrow money and to charge the whole or any part of the property belonging to the charity as security for repayment of the money borrowed or as security for a grant or the discharge of an obligation. The charity must comply as appropriate with sections 124 to 126 of the Charities Act 2011 if it wishes to mortgage land,
 - to co-operate with other chanties, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities and to exchange information and advice with them,
 - to establish or support any chantable trusts, associations or institutions formed for any of the chantable purposes included in the Objects,
 - 5 7 to acquire, merge with or to enter into any partnership or joint venture arrangement with any other chanty,
 - to set aside income as a reserve against future expenditure but only in accordance with a written policy about reserves,
 - to employ and remunerate such staff as are necessary for carrying out the work of the charity (the charity may employ or remunerate a director only to the extent it is permitted to do so by article 7 and provided it complies with the conditions in that article),

7.2 Scope and powers permitting directors' or connected persons' benefits

- 7 2 1 A director or connected person may receive a benefit from the chanty in the capacity of a beneficiary of the charity provided that a majority of the directors do not benefit in this way
- 7 2 2 A director or connected person may enter into a contract for the supply of services, or of goods that are supplied in connection with the provision of services, to the charity where that is permitted in accordance with, and subject to the conditions in, sections 185 and 186 of the Charities Act 2011
- 7.2 3 Subject to sub-clause 7 3 of this article a director or connected person may provide the charity with goods that are not supplied in connection with services provided to the charity by the director or connected person
- 7 2 4 A director or connected person may receive interest on money lent to the charity at a reasonable and proper rate which must be not more than the Bank of England base rate (also known as the base rate)
- 7 2 5 A director or connected person may receive rent for premises let by the director or connected person to the charity. The amount of the rent and the other terms of the lease must be reasonable and proper. The director concerned must withdraw from any meeting at which such a proposal or the rent or other terms of the lease are under discussion.
- 7 2 6 A director or connected person may take part in the normal trading and fundraising activities of the charity on the same terms as members of the public.

7 3 Payment for supply of goods only controls

The charity and its directors may only rely upon the authority provided by sub-clause 7.2.3 of this article if each of the following conditions is satisfied

- 7 3 1 The amount or maximum amount of the payment for the goods is set out in an agreement in writing between the charity or its directors (as the case may be) and the director or connected person supplying the goods (the supplier) under which the supplier is to supply the goods in question to or on behalf of the charity
- 7 3 2 The amount or maximum amount of the payment for the goods does not exceed what is reasonable in the circumstances for the supply of the goods in question
- 7 3 3 The other directors are satisfied that it is in the best interests of the charity to contract with the supplier rather than with someone who is not a director or connected person. In reaching that decision the directors must balance the advantage of contracting with a director or connected person against the disadvantages of doing so
- 7 3 4 The supplier is absent from the part of any meeting at which there is discussion of the proposal to enter into a contract or arrangement with him or her or it with regard to the supply of goods to the charity
- 7 3 5 The supplier does not vote on any such matter and is not to be counted when calculating whether a quorum of directors is present at the meeting
- 7 3 6 The reason for their decision is recorded by the directors in the minute book

- 7 3 7 A majority of the directors then in office are not in receipt of remuneration or payments authorised by article 7
- 7 4 In sub-clauses 7 2 and 7 3 of this article
 - 7 4 1 charity includes any company in which the charity
 - 7 4 1 1 holds more than 50% of the shares, or
 - 7 4 1 2 controls more than 50% of the voting rights attached to the shares, or
 - 7 4 1 3 has the right to appoint one or more directors to the board of the company
 - 7 4 2 connected person includes any person within the definition in article 61 (Interpretation)

DECLARATION OF DIRECTORS' INTERESTS

A director must declare the nature and extent of any interest, direct or indirect, which he or she has in a proposed transaction or arrangement with the charity or in any transaction or arrangement entered into by the charity which has not previously been declared. A director must absent himself or herself from any discussions of the charity directors in which it is possible that a conflict will arise between his or her duty to act solely in the interests of the charity and any personal interest (including but not limited to any personal financial interest)

CONFLICTS OF INTERESTS AND CONFLICTS OF LOYALTIES

9

- If a conflict of interests arises for a director because of a duty of loyalty owed to another organisation or person and the conflict is not authorised by virtue of any other provision in the articles, the unconflicted directors may authorise such a conflict of interests where the following conditions apply
 - 9 1 1 the conflicted director is absent from the part of the meeting at which there is discussion of any arrangement or transaction affecting that other organisation or person
 - 9 1 2 the conflicted director does not vote on any such matter and is not to be counted when considering whether a quorum of directors is present at the meeting, and
 - 9 1 3 the unconflicted directors consider it is in the interests of the charity to authorise the conflict of interests in the circumstances applying
- 9 2 In this article a conflict of interests arising because of a duty of loyalty owed to another organisation or person only refers to such a conflict which does not involve a direct or indirect benefit of any nature to a director or to a connected person

MEMBERS

- 10.1 The subscribers to the memorandum are the first members of the charity
- 10.2 Membership is open to other individuals or organisations who
 - 10 2 1 apply to the charity in the form required by the directors, and
 - 10 2 2 are approved by the directors

TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

- 12 Membership is terminated if
 - 12.1 the member dies or, if it is an organisation, ceases to exist,
 - 12.2 the member resigns by written notice to the charity unless, after the resignation, there would be less than two members,
 - 12.3 any sum due from the member to the charity is not paid in full within six months of it falling due,
