#### **TRUSTEES' REPORT**

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2020

The trustees present their annual report together with the accounts and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The academy trust operates 3 primary academies in the north west of England. Its academies have a combined pupil capacity of 860 (excluding Nursery provision) and had a roll of 821 in the school census in October 2020.

#### Structure, governance and management

#### **Constitution**

The academy trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust.

The charitable company operates as Weaver Trust. Within the Trust are 3 schools known as Barnton Community Primary School, Grange Community Primary School and Comberbach Primary School.

Comberbach Primary School converted to an academy and joined the Trust on 1st May 2020.

The trustees of Weaver Trust Limited are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. Details of the trustees who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

#### Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

#### Trustees' indemnities

The Academy Trust maintains Trustees', Governors' and Officers' liability insurance which gives appropriate cover for any legal action brought against them. The Academy Trust has also granted indemnities to each of its Governors and other officers to the extent permitted by law. Qualifying third party indemnity provisions (as defined by section 236 of the Companies Act 2006) were in force during the period and remain in force, in relation to certain losses and liabilities which Governors or other officers may incur to third parties in the course of acting as Governors or officers of the Academy Trust.

#### Method of recruitment and appointment or election of trustees

There are five members of the Trust. The members, as designated in the Articles of Association, have appointed eight trustees and there is one vacancy, which has been filled post year end. The CEO and the Educational Consultant are the only employees of the Trust, who are also Trustees.

A Local Governing Board has been established at each school, with two parent governors and one staff governor elected. The members as designated in the articles of association may appoint up to ten governors. All governors shall upon their appointment give a written undertaking to the foundation members/trustees to uphold the objectives of the Trust.

Members may appoint additional governors provided that the total number of governors (including ex officio governors) would not thereby exceed 25% of the total number of governors.

The Secretary of State may appoint such additional Governor as he thinks fit, if he has given the Governors a warning notice and the Governors have failed to comply, or secure compliance, with the notice to the Secretary of State's satisfaction within the compliance period.

To recruit additional trustees, a Skills Audit is undertaken and Trustees with the necessary skill's or characteristics recruited, via Academy Ambassadors.

Recommendations are then presented to Members, who decide whether the fit is right for our Trust.

#### Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees

The training and induction provided for new Trustees depends on their previous experience. All new Trustees are welcomed by the Chair and an Induction Pack is shared. They are given a tour of the schools and the chance to meet with staff and pupils. All Trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as Trustee.

New Trustees attend an Induction and have access to a full programme of courses which they will choose to attend, based on their role and experience and are subject to a formal training and induction process. Training c an take place internally or involving external organisations. The Headteacher also fully briefs all trustees on the daily operation of the school.

A review of the training needs of the trustees has been carried out during the period and the necessary requirements for further training and the induction of any new trustees will be considered in each period. Governor and Trustee training is comprehensive and reviewed regularly.

#### Organisational structure

The key management personnel of the academy trust comprise the trustees and the senior leadership team as disclosed on the Reference and Administrative page.

The CEO is the Accounting Officer for our Trust. The business of the Trust is managed by Trustees in accordance with the Scheme of Delegation.

#### Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The remuneration policy, setting the terms and conditions for the key management personnel, was developed and approved by the board of trustees, after taking advice from the Chief Executive Officer and following guidance from the relevant professional pay review bodies. The CEO is not involved in setting their own remuneration package.

The CEO and the Educational Consultant are the only staff trustees. They are remunerated, and only receive remuneration in respect of services they provide under their contracts of employment, and not in respect of their role as trustees. Specific disclosures concerning staff trustees' remuneration is included in notes to the financial statements.

The Education Consultant's was only remunerated for her employment role since 1st September 2020.

The day to day running of the remuneration policy is delegated to the CEO and monitored by the finance and resources committee. All details for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel are set out in the pay policy and appraisal policy which are reviewed annually by the board of trustees.

Remuneration of key management personnel is set at an individual level, and where possible the trustees have taken external professional advice which includes benchmarking, market trends and advice on structuring of incentives. Senior management salaries are linked closely to pay spines, helping trustees conclude that each individual is remuneration at an appropriate level. As such salaries are linked to factors such as length of service and experience. Total remuneration packages include employer pension contribution rates at specific approved rates.

The board always bear in mind the charitable status of the academy trust and in recognise the fact the trust receives funding under a funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education, and therefore ensure the remuneration paid to senior management personnel never exceeds a reasonable amount that provide value for money to the trust. The performance of senior management personnel is reviewed on a regular basis to ensure continuing value for money.

Total remuneration paid to senior management personnel is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Related parties and other connected charities and organisations

With schools in Winsford and Northwich, we play an active prole in the Local Education Partnerships. In addition to this, our CEO represents academies on the Cheshire West Association of Primary Heads.

Our schools, individually, are supported by the Friends of the School Associations, working closely to support their charitable activities.

#### **Impact of Covid-19 on Connected Parties**

Many meetings of our local Education Partnerships were initially postponed, following the national lockdown in March, but arrangements to continue meeting remotely were quickly established. Much of the debate was around the management of Covid and how this would be dealt with in our schools. Wider network meetings were also initially cancelled and different networks have been established as a direct result of the Covid-19 situation.

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Volunteers & Staff

Although officially, school was closed from the 20<sup>th</sup> March, many of our children still attended, either because they were the children of key workers, or because they had been identified as vulnerable and therefore felt to benefit by continued attendance at school.

That said, the majority of our families stayed at home and undertook home learning.

We are fortunate that the virus itself has not affected our staff and their families directly. There have however been consequences from the impact on our economy and staff have found themselves in very different positions financially as a result of this.

Face-to-face trustee meetings were cancelled and we quickly found different ways of working, through video conferencing and more frequent communication via email and telephone. However, other sorts of volunteering stopped, such as parents helpers, as we closed our doors to 'visitors' to minimise cross-contamination and the spreading of Covid.

In September, following a rigorous Risk Assessment, our schools opened their doors to all and now operate fully, albeit following stringent safety guidelines.

#### **Public benefit**

In setting our objectives our trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance.

The trust strives to promote and support the advancement of education within the local area. The school provides an extensive programme of educational and recreational activity - all designed to contribute to the overall education of our students in areas such as academic distinction, music, the arts and sport. For example, the school works with specialists to provide bespoke approaches to music and the arts, sports coaches for the enhancement and breath of sports provided and charities, with pupils and staff undertaking voluntary work.

Wherever possible the school also aims to contribute to the benefit of the wider public, by making available the premises to third parties for the provision of educational and other opportunities.

## Strategic report

## **Achievements and performance**

In the academic year 2019 / 2020, KS2 data for 2019 (ASP) shows that attainment remains at least well above the national average for all measures. This is remarkable for the schools in the Trust. However, for one of our schools this is a huge achievement given that historically attainment has never been so high.

Progress measures too are remarkable and are reflective of the highest of aspirations we have for children in our Trust and testament to the curriculum taught by skilled staff.

Comberbach Nursery and Primary School joined the Trust on May 1st 2020. Their data will be included in next year's report.

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Achievements

We were delighted to welcome our Year 6 pupils back for the last half term of the year, but were hugely disappointed to miss the opportunity to give out Y6 pupils a big Weaver Trust send off that they would normally have enjoyed.

The biggest disappointment we have had, from an achievement perspective, is the cancellation of statutory assessment in 2020. This data would have evidenced the progress that had been made at our sponsored school and the standard that had been maintained at our high-performing academy.

Whilst we quickly developed our skills with regards to online lessons and home learning, providing both online lessons and learning packs for those with limited access, we did not manage 100% engagement.

Furthermore, since school re-opening in September 2020, assessments have shown the few children are now where we would typically expect them to be at this stage in the year. We have amended our Trust curriculum, identifying gaps from the previous year. Teachers are now teaching the work that has been missed, as well as this year's curriculum to ensure that children make accelerated progress and achieve their potential.

#### Key performance indicators

The Trustees consider that the following are key performance indicators for the academy Trust:

- Pupil numbers
- · General financial stability
- Income per pupil
- Staff Costs
- · Ofsted inspection results

The Trustees feel that all key performance indicators have been met during the period.

#### Going concern

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Going Concern

Since March, we have not received any income for our Breakfast and After School Clubs, which closed and are yet to reopen. Similarly, from March to September, our nurseries closed their doors and our Nursery income has also been reduced significantly.

Beyond that, we are yet to understand the impact of 'Covid' spending on our budgets as we have had significant outlay in taking every reasonable precaution to keep our children and staff safe. We will make sure that we budget effectively to balance our budgets over this coming year.

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, the board of trustees continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the statement of accounting policies.

#### Financial review

Most of the Trust's income is obtained from the DfE in the form of grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the year and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the statements of financial activities. The principal accounting policies adopted during the year are detailed in the notes to the financial statements.

During the year ended 31 August 2020, total expenditure of £3,738,000 (2019: £3,116.000) was fully covered by grant funding from the DfE together with other incoming resources. The excess of income over expenditure (excluding actuarial losses on the defined benefit pension scheme) was £1,694,000 (2019: £1,975,000) however that does include Donations - net transfer on conversion of £1,858,000.

As at the 31st August 2020, the net book value of fixed assets was £9,146,000 (2019: £6,937,000), including the value of the land and building which are lease on a 125 year lease. The assets are used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the academy.

#### Reserves policy

The trustees review the reserve levels of the Academy Trust annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves.

The trustees will always try to match income with expenditure in the current year (set and manage a balanced budget), will only carry forward reserves that it considers necessary and will have a clear plan for how it will be used to benefit the pupils.

The trustees have determined that the appropriate level of free reserves should be equivalent to one month's cost. The reason for this is to provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipt of grant income and to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as urgent maintenance or long term sickness where unforeseen costs are incurred.

The trustees will monitor the level of reserves to ensure that they are maintained at the required level. In the event that they are partly used the trust will strive to rebuild free reserves up to the level needed.

The trust has overall reserves of £8,128,000 (2019: £6,347,000, included within is restricted general reserves (excluding pension & fixed asset reserves) of £Nil (2019: £Nil) and unrestricted reserves of £381,000 (2019: 310,000). The total free reserves (excluding pension & fixed asset reserves) amounts to £381,000 (2019: £310,000)

The pension scheme liability as at 31st August 2020 was £1,401,000 (2019: £1,112,000). The vast majority of the movement of the pension scheme liability is due to actuarial assumptions and does not have a direct cash impact.

#### **Impact of Covid-19 on Reserves**

Due to the drop in income, there is likely to be a consequence in our reserves, as we look to bridge the gap due to the loss of income in this current year. This situation will be reviewed in an ongoing basis.

## **Investment policy**

The trustees have the ability to invest the funds of the Trust as they see fit. Currently the Trust does not have any long term investments with the cash reserves of the trust being held in bank accounts. The trustees have no plans for any long term investment purchases in the near future.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trust is exposed to a variety of financial risks. The trustees have appointed a Finance Committee, who scrutinise and monitor school performance, and have a Financial Officer and accountant who produce accounts for the trustees to scrutinise and check. Monthly management accounts are produced and all financial spend is signed off monthly by the school's shared accountant. The policies set by the board of trustees are implemented by the Headteacher.

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Risks

The biggest risk to the Trust is school closure, and the impact of this on the beneficiaries of the Academy Trust.

#### **Fundraising**

The schools within the Trust undertake a variety of fundraising activities to support several charities and the Trust itself. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Fundriasing

The way in which we fundraise and maintain those links with our communities has changed significantly, as we are not in a position to welcome friends and family into our schools as we were previously. We are planning alternative ways to continue with our fundraising efforts, but appreciate that our income from this will be greatly reduced.

#### Plans for future periods

The trustees allocate the budget each year on receipt of their GAG from the ESFA. Approximately 81% of the budget is taken up each year by staffing costs with the remainder allocated for the running of the school on a day to day basis ensuring the staff has sufficient financial resources to develop and influence curriculum and pupil development to achieve the key academic performance indicators set by the trustees.

Each October the SSDP is approved by the trustees with delegated spend for key priorities given and approved. Through a system of distributed leadership, key decisions are made that improve the quality of learning for all.

#### Impact of Covid-19 on Plans for the Future

We have been working tirelessly to ensure that our Trust and the schools therein, can continue to operate effectively. Control measures have been introduced, such as hand sanitising, teaching classes and segregating them as 'bubbles' and a change to the timings of the school day.

We are confident that our control measures are robust and the overall impact of the virus will be minimal as our focus remains on delivering effective lessons and thus ensuring quality first teaching. We are optimistic that we will be able to bridge gaps and ensure good outcomes for all pupils by the end of this academic year.

#### **Auditor**

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and

#### Scope of responsibility

As trustees we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Weaver Trust Limited has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. #### Review of value for money

As accounting officer, the CEO has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- Ensuring efficient levels of staffing to meet the needs of all learners
- Undertaken procurement to ensure that the best deals have been secured for our Trust
- Shared specialist staff across the schools in the Trust

#### The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Weaver Trust Limited for the period 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts.

#### Capacity to handle risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

#### The risk and control framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- regular reviews by the finance and audit committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- identification and management of risks.

#### The board of trustees has decided:

• not to appoint an auditor for this service. However, the trustees have appointed Mr C Ridge (trustee) to perform a peer review.

The reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- testing of payroll and purchase systems
- · testing of control account/ bank reconciliations

On a annual basis, the reviewer reports to the board of trustees through the audit committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the financial responsibilities of the board of trustees, and annually prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

#### **Review of effectiveness**

As accounting officer, the CEO has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · the work of the internal reviewer;
- · the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process or the school resource management selfassessment tool;
- the work of the executive managers within the academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the audit committee and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

#### **NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2020

#### 1 Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2019 to 2020 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the trust. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £'000.

#### 1.2 Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, ie whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the accounts and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

#### 1.3 Conversion to an academy trust

The conversion from a state maintained school to an academy trust involved the transfer of identifiable assets and liabilities and the operation of the school for £nil consideration. The substance of the transfer is that of a gift and it has been accounted for on that basis as set out below.

The assets and liabilities transferred on conversion from Comberbach Primary School to the academy trust have been valued at their fair value. The fair value has been derived based on that of equivalent items. The amounts have been recognised under the appropriate balance sheet categories, with a corresponding amount recognised in Donations – transfer from local authority on conversion, in the Statement of Financial Activities and analysed under unrestricted funds, restricted general funds and restricted fixed asset funds. Further details of the transaction are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 1.4 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Grants**

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance s heet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2020

#### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

#### Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the academy trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the statement of financial activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where the receipt is probable and it can be measured reliably.

#### **Donations**

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

#### Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

#### Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the accounts until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

#### **Donated fixed assets**

Donated fixed assets are measured at fair value unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor is used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the academy trust's accounting policies.

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### **Expenditure on raising funds**

This includes all expenditure incurred by the academy trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

#### Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

#### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding that require the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Long Leasehold Straight line over 125 years

Improvement to property10% on costAssets under constructionHeld at costComputer equipment33% on costFixtures, fittings & equipment15% on cost

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

#### 1.7 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods of services it must provide.

#### 1.8 Leased assets

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

#### Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

#### **Financial liabilities**

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

#### 1.10 Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

#### 1.11 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income or expenditure are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/ asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

#### 1.12 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the [Department for Education Group].

#### 1.13 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the academy trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

#### 2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 21, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2020. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

#### Critical areas of judgement

The trustees have considered the classification of depreciation between direct and support costs. The deprecation charge has been allocated based on the proportion of teaching and support staff.

#### 21 Pension and similar obligations

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Cheshire Pension Fund. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016, and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016.

Contributions amounting to £35,083 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2020 (2019: £37,654) and are included within creditors.

#### **Teachers' Pension Scheme**

#### Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary. These contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service
  to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with
  the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service
  deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to the TPS in the period amounted to £238,622 (2019: £135,956).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

#### **Local Government Pension Scheme**

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions made for the year ended 31 August 2020 was £209,000 (2019: £204,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £168,000 (2019: £167,000) and employee's contributions totalled £41,000 (2019: 37,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 20.1% for employers and 5.5% - 12.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
