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Trustees' report For the year ended 31 August 2023

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report and a directors' report under company law.

The Valour Multi Academy Trust was formed in 2017. The Valour MAT consists of two primary schools in the west end of Newcastle upon Tyne, Beech Hill Primary and Walbottle Village Primary. The Academy has a combined capacity of 556 on roll in the school census on October 2023.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The academy is a charitable company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity.

The charitable company's Trust deed is the primary governing document of the academy.

The trustees of Valour Multi-Academy Trust are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law.

The charitable company is known as Valour Multi-Academy Trust.

Details of the trustees who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and administrative details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

Subject to the provisions of the Companies Act 2006, every member of the Local Governing Body or other officer or auditor of the company acting in relation to the academy trust shall be indemnified out of the assets of the company against any liability incurred by him in that capacity in defending any proceedings, whether civil or criminal, in which judgment is given in favour or in which he is acquitted or in connection with any application in which relief is granted to him by the court from liability for negligence, default, breach of duty or breach of trust in relation to the affairs of the company. Valour Academy Trust has purchased insurance to protect trustees from claims arising against negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring on academy trust business

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of trustees

Community appointed

- The practical arrangements of the election of members of the Local Governing Body shall be the
 responsibility of the Local Governing Body but nobody shall become a member of the Local Governing
 Body until appointed by the trustees.
- The trustees may appoint persons who are representatives of the local community to serve as community members on the Local Governing Body, having regard to any recommendations and views of the Local Governing Body in relation to ensuring that the people serving on the Local Governing Body between them have an appropriate range of skills and experience and due attention is given to succession planning.

Staff appointed

- The trustees may appoint persons who are employed at the academy trust to serve on the Local Governing Body through such process as they may determine, provided that the total number of such persons (including the Head Teacher) does not exceed one third of the total number of persons on the Local Governing Body. The positions held by those employed at the academy trust (e.g. Teaching and non-teaching staff) may be taken into account when considering appointments.
- Unless the trustees agree otherwise, in the election of persons to serve on the Local Governing Body who
 are employed at the academy trust, the Local Governing Body shall invite nominations from all staff
 employed under a contract of employment or a contract for services or otherwise engaged to provide
 services to the academy trust (excluding the Head teacher) and, where there are any contested posts,
 shall hold an election by a secret ballot. All arrangements for the calling and the conduct of the election
 and resolution of questions as to whether any person is an eligible candidate shall be determined by the
 Local Governing Body.
- The Head teacher shall be treated for all purposes as being an ex officio member of the Local Governing Body.

Parent appointed

- These shall be elected by parents of registered pupils at the academy trust and they must be a parent of a pupil at the academy trust at the time when he or she is elected. For the purpose of this document "parent" shall be interpreted in accordance with section 576(1) of the Educations Act 1996.
- The Local Governing Body shall make all necessary arrangements for, and determine all other matters relating to, an election of the parent to the Local Governing Body, including any question of whether a person is a parent of a registered pupil at the academy trust. Any election of persons who are to be the parents to the Local Governing Body shall be contested shall be held by a secret ballot.
- The arrangements made for the election of the parent to the Local Governing Body shall provide for every
 person who is entitled to vote in the election to have an opportunity to do so by post or, if he prefers, by
 having his ballot paper returned to the academy trust by a registered pupil at the academy trust.
- Where a vacancy for a parent member of the Local Governing Body is required to be filled by election, the
 Local Governing Body shall take such steps as are reasonably practical to secure that every person who
 is known to them to be a parent of a registered pupil at the academy trust is informed of the vacancy and
 that it is required to be filled by election, informed that he is entitled to stand as a candidate, and vote at
 the election, and given an opportunity to do so.
- The number of parent members of the Local Governing Body required shall be made up by persons nominated by the Local Governing Body if the number of parents standing for election is less than the number of vacancies.
- In appointing a person to be a parent member of the Local Governing Body pursuant to clause, the trustees shall appoint a person who is the parent of a registered pupil at the academy trust or where it is not reasonably practical to do so, a person who is the parent of a child of compulsory school age.

Co-opted by the Local Governing Body

- The trustees resolve that the Local Governing Body may itself co-opt up to 2 persons to serve on the Local Governing Body.
- The Local Governing Body may not co-opt a person who is employed at the academy trust if thereby the number of persons employed at the academy trust serving on the Local Governing Body would exceed one third of the total number of persons serving on the Local Governing Body (including the Head teacher).

Term of Office

- The term of office for any person serving on the Local Governing Body shall be 3 years save that:
- This time limit shall not apply to the Head Teacher; and persons who are co-opted to the Local Governing Body shall serve for 3 years.
- Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of member on the Local Governing Body and to clause below, any person may be re-appointed or re-elected (including being co-opted again) to the Local Governing Body.

No person may be reappointed or re-elected at the end of their term after serving on the Local Governing Body, for 6 years or more consecutively unless in the circumstances the trustees decide to disapply the restriction set out in this clause.

The training and induction provided for new trustees depends on their existing experience. Where necessary, induction and training is provided on charity, educational, legal and financial matters. All new trustees are given a tour of the academy trust and a chance to meet with staff and students. All trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budget, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as trustees. As there are normally only one or two trustees a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual.

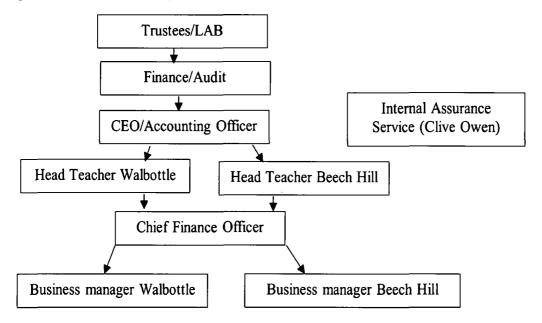
Organisational structure

As a charity and company limited by guarantee, VALOUR Multi-Academy Trust (company) is governed by a Board of Trustees (trustees), who are legally responsible for, and oversee, the management and administration of the company and the academies run by the company. Beech Hill Primary and Walbottle Village Primary are the company's academies.

The company and the trustees are accountable to external government agencies including (but not limited to) the Charity Commission, the Education and Skills Funding Agency and the Department for Education (including any successor bodies) for the quality of the education they provide and they are required to have systems in place through which they can assure themselves of quality, safety and good practice.

In order to assist the trustees in the discharge of their responsibilities, the trustees have established a Local Governing Body (Local Governing Body) at the academy trust pursuant to Articles 100-100A and 104 of the Academy Articles of Association.

The trustees have resolved to delegate certain powers in respect of the academy trust to ensure the good governance of the academy trust at a local level.



Leadership

The appointment of the Leadership team is governed by Article 107 of the Academy Articles of Association. The trustees shall appoint the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Head teachers in consultation with the Local Governing Body. The Local Governing Body may delegate such of its powers and functions under this scheme as it considers are required by the CEO for the internal organisation, management and control of the academy trust (including the implementation of all policies approved by the trustees and the subcommittees and for the direction of the teaching and curriculum at the academy trust).

Other Staff

The subcommittees shall be responsible for the appointment and management of all other staff to be employed

at the academy trust provided that the subcommittees shall:

- Comply with all policies dealing with staff issued by the trustees from time to time;
- Take account of any pay terms set by the trustees;
- Adopt any standard contracts or terms and conditions for the employment of staff issued by the trustees;
- Manage any claims and disputes with staff members having regard to any advice and recommendations given by the trustees; and
- The subcommittees shall carry out the performance management of all staff (including the CEO and leadership) at the academy trust and shall put in place procedures for the proper professional and personal development of staff.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees

The training and induction provided for new trustees depends on their existing experience. Where necessary, induction and training is provided on charity, educational, legal and financial matters. All new trustees are given a tour of the academy trust and a chance to meet with staff and students. All trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budget, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as trustees. As there are normally only one or two trustees a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual.

During the year the academy trust continued to operate a unified management structure. The structure consists of 4 levels: the LAB, the trustees, the Senior Leadership Team and the Middle Management Team. The aim of the management structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels.

Analysis and Actions

Appropriate actions will be implemented for children whose attendance has fallen below 90% and we have not been offered medical evidence of illness.

From Sept – May 2023 attendance by Pupil Premium was 91.15% and Non Pupil Premium was 95.07%. There has been a continued increase in absence due to medical appointments and operations during this academic year. This will have a link with the NHS trying to deal with their waiting lists. We continue to encourage parents to provide letters regarding the medical appointments and there has been a positive response. Children have taken longer to recover from sickness bugs, flu and sore throats etc. and therefore been absent from school longer. A GP confirmed that this winter there have been lots of nasty bugs and virus' which have affected children's health.

School priorities for 2023 - 24

The focuses at the moment in the wider world of education are reading and communication; transition between year groups and settings and the delivery of PSHE. The priorities we have set reflect the first two while the teaching of PSHE has been developed over the last few years which was reflected in the healthy school award. An instructor is coming to work with staff involved on how we teach PSHE across school.

- Cultural capital this includes our personal development plan on what children will be able to do in order to be ready for the next year group/ setting.
- Continue to strengthen Parental engagement this is the focus on empowering the parents to support
- Address Covid gaps Parent promise/Continue to provide targeted catch up post Covid to ensure attainment and progress is maintained. This will be broken down more in the development plans and will focus particularly on our more able children.
- Phonics focus with fluency this will be ensuring phonics teaching across Key Stage 2 is meeting the needs of those children who are not yet phonically fluent and that all children can read with fluency and communicate well.

Newcastle City Council have made schools aware that absences in schools have increased across the city. Walbottle Village Primary is maintaining its' attendance although there are fluctuations on a week by week basis due to illness, holidays, etc.

Childhood illnesses continue to be an issue which results in absence. The number of children suffering with flu like symptoms, sore throats, headaches etc. and potential Strep A had increased as the 2nd half term progressed and this impacted attendance. There were also cases relating to impetigo, earache, chest infections and holidays.

Strep A was widely reported in the media and families were cautious and anxious about sending children to school.

Recent figures regarding attendance show that on week beginning 17/04/23 WVP had 94.2% attendance whilst National Primaries was 93%.

Week beginning 01/05/23 saw WVP with 93.9% whilst National Primaries was 94.7%. The rolling attendance for

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

Financial review

Most of the academy trust's income is obtained from the Department of Education (DfE) via the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE/ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2023 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA).

The academy trust also received grants for fixed assets from the DfE/ESFA. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2019), such grants are shown under the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

In addition the Academy received £374,807 of Pupil Premium.

During the year ended 31 August 2023, total expenditure of £4,303k was in excess of recurrent grant funding from DfE/ESFA together with other incoming resources. The excess of expenditure over income for the year (excluding pension reserve movements and restricted fixed asset funds) was £234,643.

All of the expenditure shown in the Statement of Financial Activities is in furtherance of the academy trust's objectives.

At 31 August 2023 net book value of fixed assets was £2,552,246 and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 15 to the Financial Statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the students of the academy trust.

The provisions of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 have been applied in full in respect of LGPS pension scheme, resulting in a surplus of £212,000 which has not been recognised on the balance sheet (see note 25).

The academy trust held fund balances as at 31 August 2023 of £3,274,563 comprising £393,801 of restricted general funds, £2,581,993 of restricted fixed asset funds, a pension surplus of £nil and £298,769 of unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The academy trust holds endowment, restricted and unrestricted funds (the attached financial statements detail these funds). Unrestricted funds are held:

- To provide funds which can be designated to specific areas.
- To cover ongoing costs in relation to the running of the academy trust including catering provisions, school trips and uniform costs.

The level of reserves is reviewed by trustees regularly throughout the year. The minimum level of reserves for the ongoing needs of the academy trust is reviewed by the trustees on an annual basis. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The trustees therefore consider it is prudent to hold reserves in the general fund in the form of restricted general funds (excluding pension reserves) and unrestricted funds of £660k.

This is considered sufficient to cover 3 months' salary costs.

As at 31 August 2023 the academy trust holds available reserves of £692,570, comprising of restricted general funds (excluding pension reserves) of £393,801 and unrestricted funds of £298,769. The trustees continue to consider additional activities related to the academy trust's objectives to which the excess reserves may be applied including.

In addition a designated fund has been established for an equal pay provision. It is intended to increase this in line with any compensation claims received.

Investment policy

The trustees aim to maximise investment return whilst minimising risks to the principal sum. All free funds are held in a deposit account at market rates. It is proposed to investigate secure deposit accounts, and to manage the risk of default, deposits should be spread by banking institution and be subject to a maximum exposure of £75,000 with any PRA (Prudential Regulation Authority) authorised institution by the Bank of England (refer to Financial Conduct Authority (FCA).

Principal risks and uncertainties

The academy trust has fully implemented the requirements of the Safe Recruitment procedures and all staff have received training in this area in addition to training on Child Protection.

The academy trust is subject to a number of risks and uncertainties in common with other academies. The academy trust has in place procedures to identify and mitigate financial risks

Fundraising

The academy trust does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the trustees.

Plans for future periods

The focuses at the moment in the wider world of education are reading and communication; transition between year groups and settings and the delivery of PSHE. The priorities we have set reflect the first two while the teaching of PSHE has been developed over the last few years which was reflected in the healthy school award.

Whole trust targets for 2023-24

- 1. To further strengthen staff CPD with a focus on a progression across subjects and metacognition. This will be complemented by the training course the Deputy Head Teachers will be completing. Money ring-fenced from a draw down to facilitate opportunities to do joint observations would undoubtedly improve outcomes.
- 2. To further promote children's wellbeing through connecting to; self, others and nature. This is very much linked to developing the outdoor area and, hopefully, some joined up work with the Educational Psychology Service. This will be further enhanced through an additional amount being drawn down for CPD and resources.
- 3. To develop thinking, talking and writing like explorers and geographers in our Science and Geography curriculum. Particular focus on map work, field work in geography and practical work and conclusions in science. We are introducing a new geography curriculum this year and are looking to use a scheme in Science if it looks fit for purpose and will enhance the ability of the children to think, talk and write like a scientist.
- 4. To continue to strengthen fluency and sharing of metacognition within mathematics and Literacy.
- 5. To ensure that children make at least expected progress from previous statutory assessment year groups. This will be done through our regular tracking and looking at not just the year before's data, but the results from the previous statutory assessments.

Review of value for money

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can, therefore, only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Valour Multi-Academy Trust for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy's significant risks that has been in place for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

The risk and control framework

The academy's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees
- regular reviews by the Finance and General Purposes Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines
- · identification and management of risks

The board of trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has re-appointed Clive Owen as internal auditor. However, in accordance with ESFA requirements the trustees have appointed UNW as the external auditors.

The internal auditor's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy's financial systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included

- testing of purchase systems;
- testing of income;
- testing of accounting systems and management information produced;
- testing of gifts and hospitality & honorarium/ex-gratia payments;
- testing of information technology strategy;
- testing of fixed assets;
- testing of VAT and Corporation tax position;
- · review of budgeting and financial management including purchasing and income;
- testing of control account/bank reconciliations.

On a termly basis, the internal auditor reports to the board of trustees through the Finance and HR committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities and annually prepares a short annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

Review of effectiveness

As accounting officer, the Chief Executive Officer has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the internal auditors;
- the work of the external auditor;
- the work of the executive managers within the academy who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the Finance and HR committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

We identified the following areas as those most likely to have such an effect; health and safety, employment law, environmental law, data protection, safeguarding and child protection and certain aspects of company legislation, recognising the nature of the academy's activities. Auditing Standards limit the required audit procedures to identify non-compliance with these laws and regulations to enquiry of the trustees and other management and inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any. 1. Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements of the trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historic cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Valour Multi-Academy Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

In determining the appropriate basis of preparation of the financial statements, the trustees are required to consider whether the use of going concern is appropriate and whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the academy to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future, being a period of at least 12 months from the date of signing of these financial statements.

The trustees have performed this assessment and have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis which is considered appropriate for the following reasons.

At 31 August 2023, the free reserves position was £693k (2022: £927k) and the academy had cash of £826k (2022: £1,036k).

The trustees have prepared cash flow forecasts for a period in excess of 12 months from the date of their approval of these financial statements. The cash flow forecasts that the trustees have prepared are based on their current best estimates and are in line with the funding agreement in place with the Department for Education and show that the academy can maintain sufficient financial headroom for the foreseeable future.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the year is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the year it is receivable and to the extent the trust has provided the goods or services.

Where assets and liabilities are received by the trust on conversion to an academy, the transferred assets are measured at fair value and recognised in the balance sheet at the point when the risks and rewards of ownership pass to the trust. An equal amount of income is recognised as a transfer on conversion within 'Income from donations and capital grants' to the net assets received.

Where assets and liabilities are received on the transfer of an existing academy into the trust, the transferred assets are measured at fair value and recognised in the balance sheet at the point when the risks and rewards of ownership pass to the trust. An equal amount of income is recognised for the transfer of an existing academy into the trust within 'Income from donations and capital grants' to the net assets acquired.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the academy; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the institution with whom the funds are deposited.

1.6 Taxation

The trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.7 Intangible assets

Intangible assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost net of amortisation and any provision for impairment.

Amortisation is provided on intangible assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life.

Amortisation is provided on the following basis:

1.8 Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Depreciation is provided on the following bases:

Freehold buildings

- Over 50 years

Freehold land

- None provided

Furniture and equipment

- Over 5 years

Computer equipment

- Over 3 - 6 years

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.10 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.11 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

1.12 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the academy has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.13 Financial instruments

The academy only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy and their measurement bases are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 16. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 17. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.14 Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Accounting policies (continued)

1.15 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Government Pension Scheme ("LGPS"). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.16 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

2. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The academy makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit asset/(liability) depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 24, will impact the carrying amount of the pension asset/(liability). Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions asset/(liability) at 31 August 2023. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension asset/(liability). See note 24 and note 25 for further details.

Depreciation - Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its residual value, over the estimated economic life of that asset.

18. Statement of funds (continued)

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

The General Annual Grant (GAG) must be used for the normal running of the academy including salaries and related costs, overheads, repairs and maintenance and insurance.

Pupil Premium is additional funding to be spent as the school sees fit to support deprived students.

Other DfE/ESFA grants is other grants received not included within GAG or Pupil Premium such as Univeral Infant Free School Meals and Sport Premium income.

SEN is funding for pupils with Special Educational Needs and Other Government grants includes Early Years funding and monies received from the local authority.

Schools Direct is funding for the provision of teacher's training and towards the facilities and services necessary for such an activity.

Other Government Grants are received from Newcastle City Council to cover Special Educational Needs and Early Years.

The pension reserves is the liability due to the deficit on the Local Government Pension Scheme. Further details are shown in note 22.

The restricted fixed asset fund represents monies received to purchase fixed assets. Depreciation is charged against each fund over the useful economic life of the associated assets.

24. Pension commitments

The academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by South Tyneside Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £54,916 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2023 (2022: £53,211) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 30 October 2023. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levv)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,000 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million.
- the SCAPE discount rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 1.7% above the rate of CPI, and is based on the Office for Budget Responsibility's forecast for long-term GDP growth.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2027.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £358,562 (2022 - £357,830).

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2023 was £173,000 (2022 - £144,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £132,000 (2022 - £110,000) and employees' contributions totalled £ 41,000 (2022 - £34,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 19.7 per cent for employers and 5.5 - 12.5 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013 and on 21 July 2022, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.
