Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal Activities and Charitable Objectives

GMAC Film is an open access media centre that is committed to providing access to people interested in moving image. The organisation is a bridge between the local community and screen industry, offering a ladder of opportunities accessible to all, through training, facilities, expertise, information networks and opportunities in moving image to the widest possible community.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Following the year of strategic development, it has been a year of consolidation with a new programme, Screen Start going into development and Frances Higson, the programme manager, starting in November 2021. A strong and continuing partnership with the Fair Access Department at the RCS led to an excellent Diversity in Film open day coinciding with Glasgow Film Festival. Other partners were Africa in Motion Film Festival, Free Lens Collective and Glasgow Ansar. Round Table discussions followed presentations by Raisah Ahmed, Dave Donald, Manu Kuwera, Aileen Ritchie, Zam Salim and Paul Sng.

Again in collaboration with Fair Access at the RCS we held an extremely successful Care Experienced and Estranged session "What It Means to be Me" - a Screening and Discussion Event on 28th April 2022. The films were truly inspirational and the discussion very moving with outstanding contributions from people with lived experience.

The team is working well, but there have also been multiple funding frustrations with applications which take a lot of time to complete being rejected. However we were delighted to get the funding required to enable us to employ an outreach co-ordinator and the Screen Start Manager with funding from Resilient Scotland, Glasgow City Council and the Robertson Trust. We are particularly delighted that Screen Scotland is supporting GMAC Film again for 2022-23 with Pathway funding of £200K and Filmmakers Programme funding of £158K, to commission 12 Films, and deliver further support to filmmakers, and also membership of Screen Talent Europe.

Screen Start held an Open Day for people who registered interest - 86 people registered: those who were unable to attend in person signed into two zoom information sessions. Thirty people turned up on the day to have round table meetings with eleven industry professionals (each session lasting 20 minutes) where they were able to hear about the various jobs in the industry. Lunch was provided with an opportunity for networking. The feedback from both participants and industry professionals was that it was a most successful and informative day, as well as being really enjoyable, but very tiring!

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Media Education Teacher Training has again been carried out this year, with wonderful feedback from the teachers, citing that the training exceeded all their expectations.

GMAC Action funded by Inspiring Scotland was postponed early in the year - partly due to the continuing pandemic, but also to allow more time for referrals of young people to the programme. The Programme was carried out in May and the films shot by the young people premiered at GMAC Film on 31st August to an audience of over 40 people from the community groups, friends, family and stakeholders. There has been excellent feedback on the project from participants and host community groups, the Dixon Carers Centre and the Hidden Gardens.

Little Pictures has gone from strength to strength, with Year 3 currently interviewing for twelve filmmakers, as well as producers to have separate training to work on the films. The 2nd year films are still in post production, but will be completed soon. We are delighted to report that the number of applicants to Little Pictures 3 has stayed very high with 135 applying to make films and 27 applying to be producers. All are from target groups.

Due to the work of Wilma Smith and Little Pictures GMAC Film was invited to apply for membership of Screen Talent Europe - the application was unanimously accepted by the member companies. GMAC Film is the only United Kingdom company to join this prestigious group.

One of the Little Pictures filmmakers - Cat MacLeod who made "Little Lark" was selected to be a participant in the Directors Village - a week long intensive workshops which takes place in the Netherlands at Cine Sud. Café Flicker figures which had dropped away during the pandemic have now recovered, with numbers back up to between

50 and 60 attending on a regular basis.

Financial position

As can be seen from the Statement of Financial Activities on page 6, the company recorded a net deficit of -£8,702 (2021: surplus of £107,307) which comprised a deficit on unrestricted funds of -£22,080 (2021: £67,870), a decrease in the value of tangible fixed assets of £10,256 (2021: increase of £16,040) and a surplus on restricted funds of £23,634 (2021: £23,397). Included in the 2020-2021 surplus is a grant of £35,000 from Resilient Scotland, this was received late in the 2020-21 year and was utilised in 2021-22 to support the running costs of the charity.

The net assets of the company at year end were £108,181 (2021: £116,883) of which £37,713 related to the general fund (2021: £59,793), £23,437 represented tangible fixed assets (2021: £33,693) and £47,031 related to restricted funds (2021: £23,397).

Reserves policy

It has always been the intention of the management and Board that a reserves account equal to three months of company overhead costs can be achieved, which for the year ended 31 March 2022 equalled £74,813. This has been a long held ambition, but until it is possible to multi-year core funding it will be difficult to achieve this. The Board seeks to support management to find this through grant and trust funding.

At balance date, unrestricted reserves stood at £37,713 and so the trustees are aware this policy is not being met and continue to seek ways of generating unrestricted income to build this reserve.

FUTURE PLANS

We are delighted to report the recruitment of Euan Platt to replace Paddy Higson as Chief Executive of the Company. He will join the company on 5th September 2022. Lisa Doherty, Youth Programme Manager is also leaving to move on to new things, and we wish her every success in the future. It has been decided that with the sector moving towards a more educational emphasis, we will not recruit for this position until the new CEO has had an opportunity to decide on future policy in consultation with our lead officer at Screen Scotland. Other staff changes planned for the current year include promoting the Filmmaking Assistant to Co-ordinator, recruiting a new Assistant; promoting the Youth Programme Co-ordinator to Education Project Manager and the Youth Programme Assistant to Co-ordinator. There are also plans to recruit a Receptionist/Administrative Assistant to be confirmed by the new CEO in conjunction with the Associate Director.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Glasgow Media Access Centre Limited (GMAC) is a company limited by guarantee (No. SC155843) and a recognised Scottish charity (No. SC002525), governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

During the year Mark Langdon, Andy Harris and Mohammed Alazrac resigned from the Board due to pressure of work. Lorna King was invited to become a Trustee and joined the Board on 14th July 2022.

Working groups were formed at the Board Staff Development, day held on 26th March 2022, and will report back to the full Board. The Governance Working Group is currently looking into the revision of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, which were last scrutinised in 2014-15. Financial structures and reporting from Management to the Trustees, Programme Development, Marketing and Communications will all be on the agenda of the Working Groups.

Following the increased number of Board meetings in support of the Company during the pandemic, it was decided that the Board would revert to Quarterly Meetings during the current year, with subgroups meeting between full Board meetings. However, with the need to recruit for a new CEO a priority that schedule was postponed until later in 2022.

Organisational structure

GMAC Film is governed by a voluntary Board of Directors made up of industry professionals, business and financial expertise, community development, academic knowledge and expertise and third sector knowledge and funding expertise.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there are three members of key management: the General Manager, Creative Director and CEO. In the year to 31 March 2022, total employer costs for these posts were £99,504 (2021: £90,369).

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. The board are currently preparing a risk management policy with advice from relevant organisations.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Technical Equipment - 25% on cost
Office & Other Equipment - 25% on cost
Computer & Software - 25% on cost

Taxation

Glasgow Media Access Centre is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
