Report of the directors

The Board of Directors has pleasure in presenting its report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The charitable company information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Introduction

V&A Dundee is Scotland's first design museum and a new landmark cultural building for the nation. 2019-20 marked the museum's first full financial year of operations, following its opening on 15 September 2018 after over 11 years of planning.

Within the financial year the museum far exceeded pre-opening estimates for both visitor numbers and economic impact, welcoming over 830,000 visitors in the first 12 months and delivering an economic impact for Scotland of £75 million.

The museum continued to develop its role as an international centre for design, a major accelerator in the regeneration of the city and region, and a key part of the city's social fabric.

Within the financial year the museum met the major milestone of 10,000 people taking part in free family workshops, a moment celebrated by the First Minister meeting with Home-Start Dundee, a local charity which supports families with young children through a range of issues including post-natal depression, isolation, physical health problems and bereavement.

At the end of the financial year the museum was closed due the COVID lockdown, with staff furloughed and a rapid shift to digital delivery of programme content, continuing to engage museum audiences and local communities throughout the pandemic.

The museum development

Design Dundee Ltd was established to develop and operate V&A Dundee. The founding partners are the Victoria and Albert Museum, Dundee City Council, the University of Dundee, Abertay University and Scottish Enterprise.

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity (Registered Charity no: SC041219) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The objectives outlined in its Articles of Association are:

- to advance the arts, heritage, culture & science
- to advance education & research
- to advance citizenship & community development

The Articles of Association state that DDL will further these objectives through:

- the establishment, building, construction and promotion of a museum and associated resources and facilities based in Dundee, together with associated infrastructure development and enhancement
- the operation, management and development of the museum and other resources and facilities which provide the public with access to collections of works of art and design.
- the creation of a local, national and international centre for design & creative excellence based in Dundee.
- the development and delivery of arts & cultural activities and events, workshops, artistic
 programmes, curatorial strategy and educational and research projects.
- the establishment of a culture-based provision to foster civic pride and regeneration in Dundee and beyond.

V&A Dundee has been established in close partnership with the Victoria and Albert Museum (V&A), drawing on its world-class collections of art, design and performance, as well as the V&A's curatorial expertise and exhibitions. It is promoted as part of the V&A's family of sites.

The museum building, the first in the UK designed by Japanese architect Kengo Kuma, is part of the Dundee City Council estate and is operated by Design Dundee Limited rent free.

Mission and vision

Our mission, Enriching lives through design, summarises the enduring purpose of V&A Dundee.

Our vision sets out the five-year focus established in our Opening Business Plan 2018-23:

To create an international centre for design, inspiring people and promoting the understanding of design.

Strategic Objectives

To achieve our vision, we aim to:

- 1. Champion past, present and future design in a Scottish and global context.
- 2. Be a leader in design education, inspiring creativity and developing future skills for design and business innovation.
- 3. Create a world-class, must-see, sustainable cultural attraction.
- 4. Play an integral role in developing Dundee and the region, generating civic pride and supporting regeneration.

Highlights 2019-20

The financial year 2019-20 saw a range of major highlights in the operation of V&A Dundee, including shortlisting for major awards, reaching the 1 millionth visitor, and announcing major economic impact for Dundee and Scotland.

Programme

Two major exhibitions were opened in this financial year. Videogames: Design/Play/Disrupt ran from April to September and Hello, Robot. Design Between Human and Machine from November to February.

Videogames: Design/Play/Disrupt welcomed 46,478 visitors and Hello, Robot. Design Between Human and Machine welcomed 28,697 visitors. Exhibition attendances include ticket sales, scanned membership cards, and community and school group visits.

Videogames: Design/Play/Disrupt

Videogames: Design/Play/Disrupt celebrated and explored the cultural importance of videogames. It revealed how they are designed, how they are confronting issues such as politics, race and gender, and how the future of videogames is being shaped by huge online communities, as well as tiny independent studios and collectives around the world.

The exhibition focused on major shifts since the mid-2000s, when changing technology – from mobile phones to increasing internet speeds – transformed how games are designed, discussed and played. Visitors could see a range of fascinating objects that unpicked the design process, from rarely seen sketches and notebooks to storyboards, musical scores and computer code.

The exhibition included a major new commission from Glasgow-based illustrator Ursula Kam-Ling Cheng, who created a colourful and chaotic mural called *Girl Evader* that was inspired by virtual worlds. Cheng incorporated designs by V&A Dundee's Young People's Collective and members of the public into a special installation of PVC hangings called *Ipseity Invades!*

Videogames designed by Abertay University lecturer Niall Moody (*Hummingbird*) and Abertay graduate Llaura McGee (*If Found* by Dreamfeel) were showcased in a section focusing on the work of alternative and independent studios all over the world who curatteevents that celebrate the social side of games. The two new games were housed in bespoke arcade cabinets designed by Edinburgh studio We Throw Switches.

To accompany the exhibition, the museum commissioned a new videogame. *Plaything* is a joyous and intimate web-based game created by Will Anderson and Niall Tessier-Lavigne, which allow players to create a character in their web browser, a beautifully hand-crafted creature that grows with you.

Hello, Robot. Design Between Human and Machine

Hello, Robot. Design Between Human and Machine was a UK-exclusive exhibition organised with the Vitra Design Museum, MAK Vienna and Design Museum Gent.

With new technological developments being made every day and robots increasingly finding their way into our homes, our workplaces and even our pockets, it has never been more important to understand and shape the relationships between humans and machines. *Hello, Robot* took visitors through four stages of robot influence and evolution, asking seemingly simple questions along the way.

Outside the exhibition a new large-scale structure by robotic architecture practice Gramazio Kohler commissioned for V&A Dundee was installed. Inspired by historic Scottish building techniques and made of wooden planks and timber dowels, it was constructed in Gramazio Kohler's robotic laboratory in Zurich and tested the idea of collaboration between human and machine. The commission also included a digital interpretation developed in partnership with Abertay University.

Visitor numbers

V&A Dundee welcomed over 830,000 visitors in its first year, 330,000 more than the pre-opening estimate of 500,000 visitors.

The museum welcomed its 1 millionth visitor in February 2020, just over 500 days after it first opened.

Economic impact

V&A Dundee made a £75 million economic impact across Scotland in its first year after opening, according to independent research published in January 2020.

The study found that visitors to the museum were worth £21 million to the Dundee economy and £75 million to the overall Scottish economy in the 12 months from 15 September 2018, when the new design museum first opened its doors.

This far exceeds the predicted impacts of £10 million in Dundee and £23 million across Scotland, boosted both by a significant increase in visitor numbers – 833,015 compared to a predicted 500,000 – and a higher proportion of overseas visitors on longer trips around Scotland.

The independent study, conducted by Ekosgen and Reference Economic Consultants and commissioned by V&A Dundee, also found that the museum supported the equivalent of 696 jobs in Dundee and 2,143 across Scotland. An estimated additional 370 jobs have been created in Dundee by the museum opening.

In addition, the construction of Kengo Kuma's ground-breaking building had a further economic impact of £70 million across Scotland, helping to support 7,037 jobs.

Social impact

First Minister Nicola Sturgeon visited V&A Dundee in June 2019 to celebrate over 10,000 people taking part in free family workshops since the museum opened.

The First Minister also met with Home-Start Dundee, a local charity which supports families with young children through a range of issues including post-natal depression, isolation, physical health problems and bereavement. Before opening V&A Dundee worked with Home-Start Dundee to design the museum's activities for families.

Between opening in September 2018 and June 2019 the museum recorded 11,552 people taking part in special family workshops led by a freelance team of artists, designers and educators. These sessions take their inspiration from the museum, its galleries and exhibitions, providing materials and professional support during each workshop.

In November 2019 the museum was announced as an accredited Living Wage employer, giving its support to Dundee's commitment to be a Living Wage City, which was launched in March 2019.

Governance

Business leader and entrepreneur Tim Allan has been announced as the new Chair of the Board of V&A Dundee.

Tim Allan succeeded the founding Chair of V&A Dundee, Lesley Knox, who led the Board from the architectural competition which appointed Kengo Kuma to design the new museum in 2010. He was appointed following an open recruitment process led by the Board of V&A Dundee and took over in August 2019.

Tim Allan is the owner of Unicorn Property Group, which has invested significantly in the regeneration of Dundee's waterfront over the last decade. Tim has a wide range of other business and philanthropic interests including being the President of Scottish Chambers of Commerce. He is also on the board of the Archangels investment syndicate where he is an active investor in Scottish start-up businesses.

Awards and Honours

V&A Dundee was selected as one of five finalists for Art Fund Museum of the Year 2019, regarded as the most prestigious museum prize in the world. The annual award celebrates innovation and exceptional achievement in museums and galleries across the UK.

The other four museums shortlisted for the title were HMS Caroline, Belfast; Nottingham Contemporary; Pitt Rivers Museum, Oxford; and St Fagans National Museum of History, near Cardiff. St Fagans National Museum of History won the award.

V&A Dundee was nominated for European Museum of the Year in early December 2020, one of only three UK nominees, alongside National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh and St Fagans National Museum of History in Wales. The winner is to be announced in 2021.

Founding Director Philip Long and former V&A Dundee Chair Lesley Knox were awarded OBEs in the New Year Honours List in recognition of services to culture and heritage.

COVID closure and response

At the end of financial year 2019-20, on 19 March 2020, the museum was closed due to the COVID pandemic. Staff welfare, continuing to engage with audiences, and preparing for reopening and recovery were identified as the key strategic priorities.

The museum building was closed, bar essential security and maintenance, with staff furloughed. Programme was moved online in response.

Updates after the financial year

In April 2020 V&A Dundee's founding Director Philip Long was announced as the next Chief Executive of the National Trust for Scotland, effective from July.

Leonie Bell was appointed by the Board of V&A Dundee as the new Director in July 2020 and began her role in October. Leonie has held leadership roles with the Future Paisley Partnership at Renfrewshire Council, Scottish Government, Creative Scotland and The Lighthouse, Scotland's Centre for Architecture, Design and the City.

Leonie has worked in a diverse range of roles and organisational settings, advocating for the transformative potential of culture, creativity and design across society. Her experience includes leadership and senior management in local and national government, national agencies and in the culture sector. She also chairs the Advisory Board of Glasgow International Festival of Visual Art, is a trustee of the Edinburgh International Festival, a member of the Theophano Foundation's Prize Advisory Council and an Honorary Professor, School of Art and Design, University of Dundee.

In September 2020 three new Board members were announced: Beth Bate, Director of Dundee Contemporary Arts; Paul Brewer, Chartered Accountant and former Partner and Corporate Finance Adviser at PricewaterhouseCoopers; and Rachel Lloyd, Director at Message House, the research and communications consultancy.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Design Duridee Limited is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Related parties & relationship

The company was established with the express aim of organising the development and delivery of the V&A Dundee. The founder members have created Design Dundee Limited which will drive the development and delivery of the project. The founder members are Dundee City Council, the Universities of Dundee and Abertay, Scottish Enterprise and the Victoria & Albert Museum.

Decision-making process

The decision-making process is a majority vote of the directors. In the case of an equality of votes, the Chair will have a second casting vote. Where matters require the approval of the founder members the Chair shall not be entitled to cast a second or casting vote in the case of an equality of votes.

Recruitment, induction and training of directors

New directors are recruited and appointed according to the workload of the board in terms of both the business of the company and the needs of Design Dundee Limited Induction information is provided to all new directors, and ongoing training is available to all existing directors as required.

As founding members, Abertay University and Scottish Enterprise retain the right to nominate a new Board Director and alternate.

The board of directors met nine times during the year.

A director may appoint an alternate director who can attend and vote at meetings where the director will not be present. Alternate directors shall remain in place until their appointing director removes them or the appointing director leaves their own position.

All directors are considered to be trustees in terms of Charities Legislation.

Risk management

The risk process is overseen by the Finance and Risk Committee and constitutes individual project and department risk assessments and registers and a strategic risk register. In the strategic risk register, key risks are around funding and financial sustainability, staffing and expertise, COVID-19 and BREXIT. The directors are satisfied that appropriate systems are in place to mitigate these risks.

Plans for future years

V&A Dundee is Scotland's only museum dedicated to design. With more than 1,700 square metres of flexible gallery space, the largest Scottish museum-standard exhibition space, V&A Dundee will continue to showcase world class design.

The COVID pandemic has continued to affect the museum during 2020. V&A Dundee secured various additional funding from the main UK and Scottish Government schemes. This allowed the business to continue digitally and to build up for reopening. After reopening on 26 August 2020, visitor capacities were restricted in the museum and demand was significantly reduced due to travel restrictions. The museum opened with a five-day week. With the second national lockdown, the museum had to close again on 26 December 2020. The planned reopening date, if restrictions are lifted, will be 1 May 2021 and the main exhibition will be Night Fever: Designing Club Culture.

During 2020-21 the V&A Dundee gratefully received an additional £2m from Scottish Government and a further £1m Emergency Funding.

Financial Report

The group has a deficit for the year ended 31 March 2020 of £1,108,873 (2019 - £779,924 surplus). The movement for the year in unrestricted funds amounted to a deficit of £1,110,017 (2019 - £258,110 surplus), the movement for the year in restricted funds amounted to a surplus of £1,144 (2019 - £521,814).

The group has net assets at the 31 March 2020 of £561,601 (2019 - £1,670,474).

Group entities

Design Dundee Limited is the parent company of a small group.

The principal activity of the subsidiary, Design Dundee Enterprises Limited, is the running of the gift shop and receives commission income from the café and restaurant.

Key management personnel remuneration

Directors are recruited via advertising and an interview by the board of directors and are invited to join the board. New directors are offered a full induction programme to the organisation covering all aspects of the business. Directors have an ongoing opportunity to participate in any internal or external training available to the organisation. Directors have regular opportunities to meet with managers and staff in the organisation.

The directors consider only one director, along with other members of the management team to be key management personnel, in charge of directing and controlling the charitable company. Directors are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them and withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. The pay of key management personnel is reviewed annually and set by the remuneration committee.

Reserves policy

Reserves should be held to service working capital requirements, unexpected events such as an annual operating deficit, unforeseen and anomalous expenditure, as well as, shortfalls in income, for instance the loss a material source of funding. The Board have approved a policy with the intention to build reserves to £500,000 which equates to approximately six weeks' running costs.

It is recognised that it may take some years to build up such reserves to an appropriate level for the size of the project. The target could feasibly be achieved by a strategy covering legacies and discussions with the principal funders and founders.

In April 2020, V&A Dundee received from Scottish Government a welcomed £2m additional funding for the year. There was a further £1m from Scottish Government of Emergency COVID funding in January 2021. These have both helped to boost the unrestricted reserves position post year end.

Auditors

1 Accounting policies

Status of the company and liability of members

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee of its members and does not have a share capital. Each member has undertaken to contribute an amount not exceeding one pound towards any deficit arising in the event of the company being wound up.

Company information

Design Dundee Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is Whitehall House, 33 Yeaman Shore, Dundee, DD1 4BJ.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Design Dundee Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and include the results of the operations of the charitable company as indicated in the Directors' Report, all of which are continuing.

Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors are satisfied that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

Like the rest of society, V&A Dundee is facing significant uncertainty from COVID-19. Capacity restrictions, travel restrictions, further lockdowns and an understandably cautious public has led to a significant reduction in footfall and revenues. This uncertainty remains with all visitor attractions, and even with the successful start to the vaccine roll out there is little visibility of life and normal visitor behaviour returning back to normal. In order to deal with these conditions, the V&A Dundee has:

- Reviewed and reduced the level of activity and expenditure in the coming year.
- Developed a successful Dundee Cultural Recovery Fund to generate significant donations for the museum.
- Maintained a regular dialogue with both UK and Scottish Governments around the
 expectation for 2021. The Scottish Government will provide additional funding of £2m
 a year for three years to support V&A Dundee's operations as both Scotland's design
 museum and centre for design, in addition to its current commitment of £1 million a
 year. This new funding will provide long-term financial sustainability for V&A Dundee
 and protect museum jobs.
- Has an existing bank facility of £0.5m. This will be renewed in May 2021.



Notes to the consolidated financial statements (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Group financial statements

These financial statements consolidated the results of the charitable company and it's wholly owned subsidiary, Design Dundee Enterprises Limited, on a line by line basis.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the group in the preparation of the financial statements.

Income

Income is recognised when the charitable company has entitlement to funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government or other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the company has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

In kind support has been valued at the cost of the goods or services provided, and recognised as income when received by the charitable company.

Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal obligation to pay for expenditure.

- Cost of raising funds includes all fundraising costs.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the V&A Dundee project.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charitable company and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories.

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings - 4 years straight line
Software and content - 4 years straight line
Museum infrastructure 4 years straight line

Stock

Stock is valued on the basis of actual cost or net realisable value if lower.



Notes to the consolidated financial statements (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Exhibition costs are prepaid when all or part of the exhibition is due to take place after the year end.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand are basic financial assets and include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charitable company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Pension schemes

Design Dundee Limited make contributions to the Royal London pension scheme, a defined contribution scheme, the assets of the scheme being held separately from the assets of the company. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the scheme. The company liability is limited to the amount of the contribution.

Funds

All income and expenditure is dealt with through the Statement of Financial Activities. Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific trusts, which may be declared by the donor or with their authority (eg by the restrictive wording of an appeal). Some are restricted income funds expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of a particular activity. Others are capital funds where the assets are required to be invested for long term use.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the objects of the company.

Designated funds are expendable on specific purposes, the purpose of which has been determined by the directors.

A transfer is made from unrestricted funds to restricted funds to compensate fully all restricted funds which would otherwise be in deficit at the accounting date.



1 Accounting policies (continued)

Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charitable company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are revised on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Estimates made by the directors include depreciation charged on tangible fixed assets, potential bad debt and stock provisions, prepaid exhibition costs, accrued income, deferred income and accruals.

2 Financial activities of the charitable company

The financial activities shown in the consolidated statement of financial activities includes those of the charitable company's wholly owned subsidiary, Design Dundee Enterprises Limited.

Scottish Enterprise - Founding partner

During the year, in kind support was received amounting to £Nil (2019 - £8,750) and revenue contributions of £153,360 (2019 - £62,324). In addition, costs were paid to Scottish Enterprise of £102 (2019 - £4,367). The balance outstanding at the year end was a debtor balance of £144,769 (2019 - £31,536).
